SHOT MAN WHO BEAT HIS MOTHER

HER TEN YEARS OLD BOY SAVED LIFE OF MRS. E. A. SPIRES, IN WILMINGTON.

C. W. Bunday, while intoxicated, was unmercifully beating his landlady.

MRS. SPIRES' CONDITION REGARDED AS SERIOUS

BUNDAY, WHO WAS NOT BADLY HURT, WAS PLACED IN JAIL, AND THE BOY WAS COMMENDED BY THE COURT FOR HIS ACTION.

Wilmington, N. C., Aug. 15.—G. W. Bunday, while unmercifully beating Mrs. E. A. Spires, his boarding-house keeper in this city early this morning, was shot by her ten years old son. The wound is not serious, the ball having struck his head and passed around the skull instead of fracturing it.

Bunday was drinking and assaulted the woman with a hatchet badly wounding her about the head, face and shoulders.

It was while he had her on the floor, beating her, that the lad ran in the room and shot him. Mrs. Spires was sent to the hospital. Her injuries are very serious. The brave boy who saved his mother's life by firing the pistol when he did was commended for his gallantry by the court, and dismissed.

KING THANKFUL FOR HIS RECOVERY

Cowes, Aug. 15.—King Edward's reply to an address from the city of Portsmouth yesterday was handed to the mayor of Portsmouth today. On behalf of himself and Queen Alexandra, his majesty thanks the city for its kindness on his coronation, the recovery of his health and the conclusion of peace, and adds:

"We are unfeignedly thankful for the mercies which it has pleased Almighty God to vouchsafe to us and to our people, and we trust now, that we are happily at peace with all the world, that the recent rejoicings wherein the whole empire shared, may send us forward, each in his own field to work with renewed earnestness for the maintenance and improvement of our nation and the accomplishment of the ends that become a great people. For myself I shall ever be stimulated in my exertions for the welfare of the empire by the recollection of a tribute of loyalty and affection which has touched me deeply."

RACE WAR FEARED IN VIRGINIA CO.

Alexandria, Va., Aug. 15.—Last week John Horner, colored, was taken back to Westmoreland county under military guard and tried and sentenced to die next month, for rape.

Last week a young white man named Joseph Thorral in King George, an adjoining county, was charged with criminally assaulting two little negro girls. Thorral was arrested in an adjoining county and tried quickly, then bailed. He jumped his bail and the King George authorities are apparently making great efforts to capture him, although there is much muttering among the negroes thereabouts. It will require military protection if he is captured, or a race war will ensue.

NO SPECIAL SESSION, SAYS SENATOR HANNA

HE ALSO SAYS ANNEXATION IS LOGICAL OUTCOME OF CUBAN SITUATION.

Detroit, Aug. 15.—Senator Hanna said today: "I am very sure no special session will be held." As to the reciprocity treaty with Cuba, the senator said: "While there is a strong feeling that the United States, in accordance with their promises, should afford Cuba some relief, to my mind annexation is the logical outcome of events."

It is expected here that General R. A. Alger will announce Monday that he will seek to succeed the late Senator McMillan.

TIENTSIN'S GOVERNMENT IN CHINESE HANDS

Pekin, Aug. 15.—The government of Tien Tsin, which has been administered by foreigners for a long time, was today handed over to Viceroy Yuan Shih Kai, in accordance with the agreement between the powers and China.

Yuan Shih Kai made a triumphal journey from Peking to Tien Tsin. He was given a reception at the station.

HOTTEST DAY THIS YEAR

Van Buren, Ark., Aug. 15.—A telephone message just received from Dyer, ten miles east of here, states that five men were overcome by heat today and three have died. The other two cannot recover. They were working on railroad construction work and their names could not be learned tonight. This has been the hottest day known here this year.

DEPUTIES CHARGED WITH RIOTING HELD IN BAIL

Wilkesbarre, Pa., Aug. 15.—The twenty-five deputies and employees of the Warnke washery at Duryea, who were arrested yesterday afternoon charged with rioting and committed to jail in default of \$3000 bail each, were given a habeas corpus hearing in court today and released upon furnishing a bond of \$10,000 for the entire party. Hon. J. T. Lananan, counsel for the prisoners, furnished the bond. Immediately after their release the deputies took a train for Duryea, where it is said they will go on duty again.

FRANCE'S EXPELLED NUNS WOULD COME OVER HERE

Rome, Aug. 15.—Members of the religious orders expelled from France, especially sisters, are applying to the vatican authorities for permission to settle in the United States. Several of them have come to Rome personally for the purpose of urging their requests. A reply has been sent to them, pointing out that there are no vacancies in the United States, and, besides, calling attention to the difficulty arising from the fact that the expelled sisters do not speak the English language. Canada has been suggested as a better field, as sisters are comparatively scarce there and because French is spoken in a large area of the Dominion. The applicants, however, did not take kindly to the suggestion and persist in their requests to go to the United States.

40 RAILROADS WILL BE SUED

SUIT IS BROUGHT ON BEHALF OF THE INTERSTATE COMMERCE MISSION.

Allegation Is Discrimination Against Wilmington in the Matter of Freight Rates.

SOUTHERN, S. A. L. AND A. C. L. PRINCIPALS

BILL IN EQUITY IS TO BE FILED TODAY IN FEDERAL COURT AGAINST THESE THREE ROADS AND THEIR CONNECTIONS.

Raleigh, Aug. 15.—District Attorney Harry Skinner left here this morning for Washington to bring suit in the Federal court against forty railroads. He will file a bill in equity tomorrow, in behalf of the interstate commerce commission against the Southern Railway, the Seaboard Air Line and the Atlantic Coast Line. The proceeding is instituted to enforce compliance with the order of the commission against Wilmington in favor of Richmond and Norfolk in the matter of freight rates from western points. Every railroad in the south and west making connection with the three systems named is defendant to the suit.

It is reported today that a seven-story hotel will be built on a corner opposite the site of the Masonic temple. Persons interested in the hotel enterprise would neither confirm nor deny the story. Advice from Greensboro today indicate surrender on the Masonic temple question, and it is now regarded as certain that Raleigh's proposition will be accepted. This will insure a large and handsome building and will make the state capital permanent headquarters of North Carolina masonry.

A \$250,000 FIRE IN HAMILTON, O.

Hamilton, O., Aug. 15.—A most destructive fire began about midnight and was not under control until 4 a. m. The large dry goods store of T. V. Howell & Son, where the fire originated, was made a total wreck. The Second National bank building, adjoining the Powell block on the west, was damaged considerably by fire and water, but the bank itself escaped with slight damage. While the fire was in progress, fire broke out in Walnut street in a small grocery store. Cincinnati was called upon for help. Two engines were sent, but by the time they arrived the fire was under control and they were not taken from the train. The Walnut street fire was easily extinguished. Hick's stationery store in the basement of the Howell block was destroyed. The large carpet store of Creighton & Hooven, adjoining Howell, was seriously damaged. The losses are estimated at a quarter of a million, mainly in the Howell and Second National bank blocks.

The loss to T. V. Howell & Son is estimated at \$200,000; Second National bank, \$4,000; Holbrook Bros., dry goods, \$12,000; Heck, stationers, \$2,000. Several offices of dentists, physicians and architects were located in the Howell block and were destroyed. No statement of the amount of insurance carried has been made.

PERMANENT SCHOLARSHIPS GIVEN BY MISS HELEN GOULD

Miss Helen Gould, who has for some time been giving two scholarships in the Home Industrial school in Victoria, has placed the scholarships there permanently. These were formerly valued at \$2000 each but now she has made a permanent endowment of \$4000. Miss Gould has always taken great interest in this institution and for this reason she made a visit to Asheville several months ago. At that time she had been thinking of making the endowment but it was very recently decided that she would make the gift.

building, company today after a successful trial trip. The figures "29.51" painted on the smokestack represented the maximum speed in knots attained by the destroyer on her trial. President Sedgwick of the shipbuilding company says the Chauncey made an average speed of 28.64 knots in her four trial runs, during the endurance trial of one hour she averaged 28.30 knots, or nearly one knot above the speed requirements. The speedy little vessel will be turned over to the government shortly.

A TIDAL WAVE DESTROYS TOWNS

Fifty Bodies Have Been Washed Ashore, and Fatalities May Far Exceed This Number—Several Towns are Destroyed.

Austin, Texas, Aug. 15.—A Cullascan, Mexico, despatch says:

"The lower portion of the city of Atlatla, on the Pacific coast just west of Cullascan has been completely destroyed by a tidal wave. Not less than fifty are drowned, and the loss of life may be several times that number. Several smaller towns along the coast are washed away. The loss of life is large. The federal and state governments are relieving the distress."

NATIONAL MUSIC TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION WILL COME
