

RAH ROAD PASSENGERS CAN FIND OUT ABOUT TRAINS

Big Placards Placed on the Trains Give Full Information.

It will not be the fault of the Southern railroad in the future if persons miss their trains at the passenger station at Asheville.

Large sheetiron signs with black background and flashing gold letters are now on hand to assist the passenger in finding his train. The signs are hung on every incoming and outgoing train between the sleeper and the first class coach. Immediately on the arrival of a train the colored depot porter takes the proper sign from the rack and places it on the train. This sign bears as much information about the train on which it hangs as a con-

ductor could give if he talked a half hour. The signs got here yesterday morning from Spencer, where the South-
