

Neighbors say that Gunther, who safe. was chauffeur employed at a public garage, drove up to his home in an obile Saturday afternoon nutomobile Saturday afternoon and shortly afterward they heard sounds of a quarrel, of a struggle and of furniture being over-turned, then a succession of revolver shots.

The dead man was thirty-five years old and his wife thirty-two. His wife is expected to die.
