National Campaign IN INTEREST OF MISSION MOVEMENT Among the Laymen

Men's Missionary Conventions Will Be Held in 75 Cities—More Than 100,000 Are Expected to Attend—Campaign Opens at Buffalo This Week—Eminent Speakers.

New York, Oct. 12.—Unique in the history of religious movements is the national missionary campaign which will be launched this week by the Laymen's Missionary Movement, representing the laymen of all the Protestant churches in the United States. In 75 principal cities, east and west, north and south, men's missionary conventions will be held, at which an aggregate attendance of more than one hundred thousand men is expected.

Among those who will take part in the campaign as speakers besides President Taft are Chief Forester Gifford Pinchot, Ambassador James Bryce from Great Britain, Henry R. F. MacFarland, president of the board of commissioners of the District of Columbia, former secretary of State John W. Foster, William Jay Schieffelin, president of the Citicorp Union of New York, John B. Mott, general secretary of the World's Student Christian Federation, Rear Admiral A. T. Mahan, Lieut. Colonel E. W. Hartford, Robert E. Speer of New York, George Wharton Pepper of Philadelphia, Joshua Levering and John Timothy Stone of Baltimore, former Governor Northern of Georgia, John E. Pepper of Memphis, Tenn., Judge Selden P. Spencer of St. Louis, E. W. Stevens of Columbia, Mo., William J. Bryan, Samuel R. Chapin of Boston, William H. Lewis of Seattle, George Sherwood Eddy of India, and J. Campbell White, general secretary of the Laymen's Missionary Movement.

The announced object of the campaign is to arouse the Protestant churches of the United States to a realization that the opportunities for missionary work all over the world are greater than ever before and secure especially the co-operation of the men of the churches in a great increase of support for the missionary boards and societies. The Laymen's Missionary Movement does not raise any money but seeks to stimulate men of all churches to give more generously through their regular church channels.

The campaign will open at Buffalo, N. Y., on October 16. The meetings during the first two weeks will include Cleveland, and some of the cities of the East and South. In November, the circuit will swing along the eastern coast and include Providence, Boston, Washington, Baltimore and Philadelphia. It will swing as far west as Detroit in December. Three or four days will be spent in each city. The Washington convention will be of national importance. It is there that President Taft will give his testimony to the value and success of the missionary enterprise as he has seen it in the Far East. Chief Forester Pinchot is chairman of the Washington convention committee. Ambassador Bryce and other speakers of national and international reputation will be on the program. A whole week will be devoted to New York city during the first part of January. The promoters expect that the greatest aggregation of missionary speakers ever assembled will unite in a campaign in Greater New York. After this meeting, the work will be divided between two teams of speakers and simultaneous conventions will be held South and North, the double series culminating in a great national missionary congress in Chicago, May 2-6. This meeting will be held in the auditorium and five thousand representative laymen and ministers will be present. Speakers from all over the world will be heard.

Local committees which in most cases number from one hundred to two hundred men have been working aggressively for some months. In many of the cities the preliminary arrangements are practically completed. Each city will care for its own local expenses. The ministerial associations of practically all the cities have given their hearty approval to the movement and many churches will over their services for several weeks to a consideration of missionary subjects. The conventions themselves will last about three days in the midst of this period of general missionary agitation in the churches of a city. In most cities the convention will open with a dinner or supper at which an average of a thousand men are expected to be present. Meetings for the consideration of plans of missionary finance will also be held and great mass meetings of men arranged. Besides the local committees, the executive committee of the Laymen's Missionary Movement, with headquarters in the Metropolitan Life building, in New York, is busily promoting the campaign. In addition to the corps of secretaries and clerks at work in various parts of the coun-

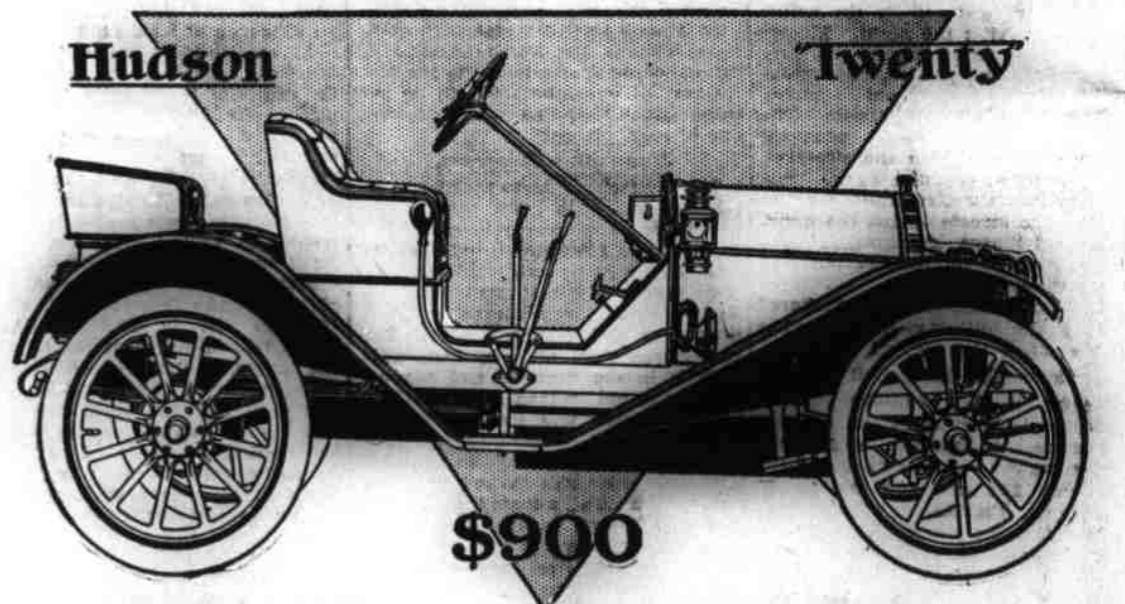
