RELIGIOUS CENSUS TO BE TAKEN HERE

This Course Decided upon at Meeting of Executive Committee of Sunday School Association.

The executive committee of the Buncombe County Sunday School association held its first quarterly meeting in the Y. M. C. A. Building at 5 p. m. yesterday.

There were present: Rev. Lewis Collins, president, Rev. J. S. Williams, vice-pres., W. C. McConnell, secretary, Claybrook James, F. M. Weaver, and Edgar Collier.

In planning for institutes in the early future and for the local convention of 1910, it was thought best to divide the territory into districts, as follows:

District No. 1—Asheville. No. 2—Avery's Creek, Limestone and Fairview townships. No. 3—Lower and Upper Hominy. No. 4—Lester and Sandy Mush. No. 5—Flat Creek, French road and Brown's Creek. No. 6—Jay Township. No. 7—Swannanoa and Black Mountain.

It is hoped that at least one institute can be held in each district before January 1, using this program: 1. How our Bible came to us. 2. Buncombe Co. S. S. Association, its purpose and methods. 3. Business: completing roll of schools in the district. Naming the day of the week and the month for holding a convention.

4. Live men wanted in S. S. to hold the boys and win other men. The treasurer was directed to send \$25.00 to North Carolina Sunday School association. Letters for correspondence were authorized.

The organizing of an elementary or graded union for teachers of beginners, primaries, juniors and intermediates, and of a union teacher training class, were considered and action postponed.

A house-to-house canvass, or religious census, was ordered for the last week in November or first in December. Each Sunday school in the city will furnish a course of visitors, who will go in pairs representing two denominations, and complete the census in a single day or half day.

OPEN SEASON FOR QUAIL SHOOTING

Ban is Lifted from the Hunters After Nov. 15, and Hardware Dealers Are Laying in Supplies.

The "open season" for quail shooting in Buncombe county will be on now with a little less than three weeks, and the sportsmen in Asheville are fast making ready for the hunt. The game laws as amended by the last legislature permit the shooting of quail in Buncombe county between November 15 and February 1, but prohibit absolutely the sale. It is intended by sportsmen that this is a wise law, that while it does not stop altogether the sport, at the same time it does put an end to what is commonly termed "pot hunting"—hunting and trapping of birds for the market—and thus tends to protect to a greater extent the game.

In anticipation of the opening of the bird season the hardware dealers in town are replenishing their stocks of shells and other necessities and everything is about ready for the onslaught on the quail.

The Asheville Hardware company has a "sportsmen's window" on its South Main street front that is attracting the attention of hunters. It is a window that has been artistically arranged; it contains all those incidentals necessary to outfit a hunter for the field and to whet his appetite for the open season and likewise a "hot bird and a cold bottle."

There are also cartridge belts and hunting jackets of every pattern and fiber; pistol holsters, leg-gins; caps and hunting breeches. In fact the window is replete with all that tends to the delight and comfort of the sportsman going a-field. There are shown handsome illustrations of game: pheasant, quail, etc., with a demonstration of the accuracy of the guns sold by the company.

ARE FURNISHING U. S. COURT ROOM

It is Hoped the Work Will Be Done Before the Opening of Next Session of Court.

Workmen are very busy these days in a effort to complete the furnishing of the United States court room in the government building before the opening of the United States District court next Tuesday. When completely furnished, the court room will be one of the handsomest in the state; the whole is being fitted out with quartered oak furniture. The court room, inside the bar, is covered with a heavy moss-green carpet, and furnished with nice oak chairs, matching in color the judge's desk and clerk's desk. Outside the bar, the floor will be covered with linoleum, and oak seats installed.

Clerk Hyams' office, too, is undergoing a great change. In this office is being installed a counter, something similar to a counter in a bank. In this counter are many drawers and book shelves, the latter having roller tops, so the court books can be kept in place during the day. The clerk's office will be furnished with quartered oak desks and the floor covered with a pretty moss-green carpet. Besides this, Mr. Hyams will have a gate to keep people from coming behind the counter. Globe-Wernicke book cases are being placed in all the offices. These changes will, if nothing prevents, be completed by Tuesday.

PLAN FOR BEAUTIFYING THE SCHOOL PROPERTIES

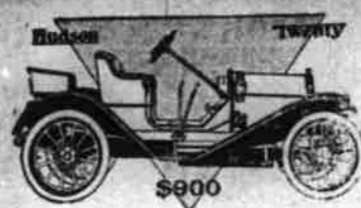

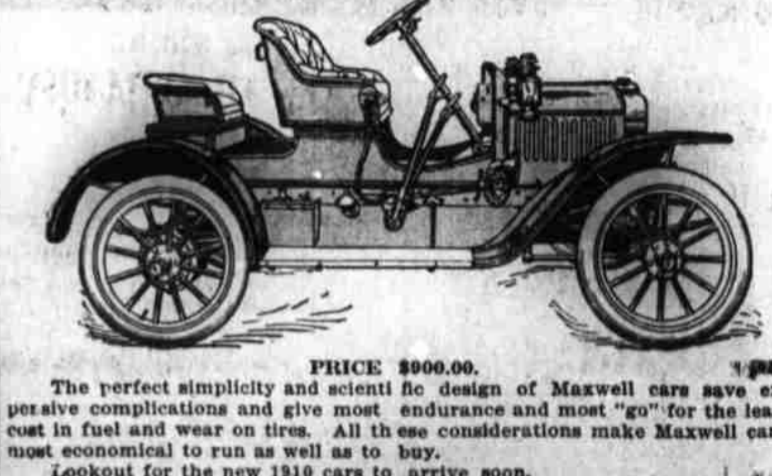
