Howland's tract of 282 acres, and the Vance place, the old orchard, 9 acres, mak ing a contiguous estate of about 450 acres, which property the owner will make the most attractive location for homes in the entire south.

Further announcement is made today that Mr. Grove will build an ineline or counterweight railway from a oint near the terminus of the Charlotte street car line to the top of the

He will also build an automobile road from Charlotte street, to the summit of the mountain, winding through his own lands; and will op erate an automobile line from the Grove park office over this road, through the park, for the accommodation of residents and others.


