

E. W. GROVE'S DEVELOPMENT SCHEME EXPANDED TO COVER AN AREA OF MORE THAN 400 ACRES

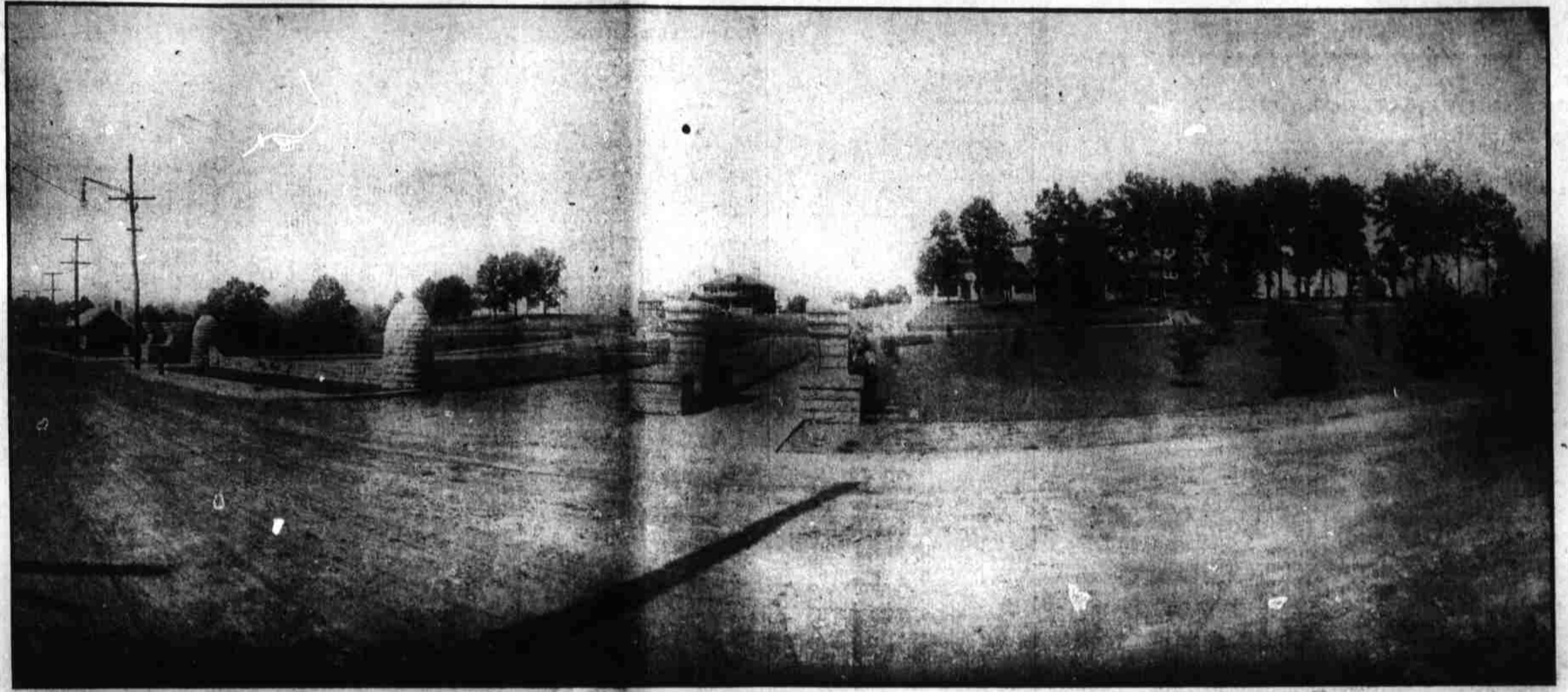
INITIAL COST ABOUT \$75,000

A COUNTERWEIGHT RAILWAY AND AN AUTOMOBILE ROAD

The Plan More Than Quadrupled-- Mountain Side to Be Transformed into a Place of Artistic Beauty.

Mr. Grove's idea, in a few words, is set forth by him as that of making the most attractive location for homes in the entire south. It involves a comprehensive scheme of road building and landscape architecture. He is apparently actuated mainly by the impulse to accomplish something that will be great, and beautiful, and permanent.

THE OWNERS' LATEST PLANS.

Construction of a counterweight railway to the summit of Sunset mountain. Construction of an automobile road traversing the park. Establishment of an automobile line.

THE E. W. Grove park residential development is more than quadrupled in magnitude by transactions which have culminated today.

Further announcement is made today that Mr. Grove will build an incline or counterweight railway from a point near the terminus of the Charlotte street car line to the top of the mountain.

He will also build an automobile road from Charlotte street, to the summit of the mountain, winding through his own lands, and will operate an automobile line from the Grove park office over this road, through the park, for the accommodation of residents and others.

PLAN OF ADJUSTMENT APPROVED BY CLABAUGH

Plan, if Perfected, Will Take Seaboard out of Hands of the Receivers.

Washington, Oct. 28.—Chief Justice Clabaugh of the District court approves the plan of adjustment agreed on between the Seaboard Air Line railway, the Continental Trust company, trustee under the first mortgage on the railroad property, and other creditors of the company.

COMMISSION'S MEMBERSHIP HAS NOT YET BEEN NAMED

Men Who Fill Vacancies in Seaboard's Organization to Be Selected by November 11.

Baltimore, Md., Oct. 28.—It was ascertained here today that the membership of the special commission appointed by the board of directors of the Seaboard Air Line, to fill existing vacancies in the organization, including the office of president, has not yet been named.

It is understood the selection will be made by November 11.

BULLS' RAMPAGE IN COTTON MARKET

Trading More Excited Than Yesterday-- Scenes Like Those of Old Sully Days.

New York, Oct. 28.—The cotton market was even more excited than yesterday, during this morning's trading, and still higher records were made by prices, with December selling at 14:67 and May at 14:82, or \$1.25 to \$1.35 per bale, above the closing figures of last night.

A big advance in the Liverpool market and a very bullish report from southern spot centers added to the bullish enthusiasm created by small estimates of the crop, and trading was the most active ever witnessed on the New York cotton exchange, except, possibly, at times during the Sully year.

Enormous realizing checked the advance late in the forenoon, but southern and western leaders were said to be predicting still higher prices and in spite of heavy demands for margins by local brokers, outside buying was on a tremendous scale.

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VIGILANT WATCH FOR THE BODIES

There is Little Hope That There Will Be More Than Six Survivors of the Wreck of Hestia.

Yarmouth, N. S., Oct. 28.—Along the Nova Scotia coast little groups of the fishermen and others kept vigilant watch today for bodies from the steamer Hestia, wrecked off the Grand Manan island. There was little hope, however, that any additional living survivors would be picked up.

A NEW RAILROAD SYSTEM FROM EAST TO THE WEST
