HARDIN AND CRAIG GIVEN A HEARING

Both Men Were Bound Over to Court Following Their Preliminary Trial at Bryson City.

Correspondence of The Gazette-News, Bryson City, Nov. 21.—Harry Hardin and Will Craig, two men who were captured by the sheriff and a posse of citizens several days ago, were tried before Justice of the Peace R. H. White here Friday evening. Hardin was found guilty of using a deadly weapon with intent to kill in the recent row at Yellow Hill. He was bound over to next term of the Superior court under a certified bond of \$700, which he could not raise, and will have to remain in jail until trial. Craig, who is thought to be less dangerous, was found guilty on the same charge and held under \$200 bond. Deputy Sheriff S. T. Block, while talking to a Gazette-News reporter, stated that in an interview with Hardin, he was found to be a man well educated and had traveled extensively all over the United States. Craig is also wanted in Waverly on the charge of breaking out of jail, where he was placed for being drunk and disorderly on the streets.

TWEED CASES ARE SET FOR TOMORROW

Homicide Cases from Madison Will Occupy Rest of Term of Superior Court.

Superior court will tomorrow take up the Tweed homicide cases from Madison county and it is probable that the remainder of the term will be devoted to the trial of those interesting and important cases. The Tweeds—Robert and Major—are charged with killing Andy Franklin and Arthur Franklin on White Rock, Madison county, late one evening several months ago, and at the Madison county term of Superior court recently the cases were ordered removed to Jacksonville for trial. A venire of 200 men has been summoned by the sheriff's office and from this number it is hoped to speedily secure a jury to pass upon the guilt or innocence of the defendants.

In court Saturday afternoon John O'Donnell and James Swinney, indicted several months ago by the grand jury, charged with violation of the prohibition laws, entered pleas of not guilty and were fined \$500 each by the court.

The case of State vs. John Alby, charged with retailing, was called and the trial started, but the state's chief witness failed to give evidence in support of the charge and a mistrial was had.
