HE HOUSES TO ROPE THE LIONS

Buffalo Jones is Going to Africa to Hunt the King of Beasts With the Lariat.

New York, Dec. 2.—"Buffalo" Jones, who is known throughout the country as the man to whom most credit belongs for preventing the total extinction of the buffalo, has arrived in New York preparatory to sailing for Africa, where he hopes to gain new laurels by roping lions and other varieties of wild animals that make the jungles of the Dark Continent their habitat. Mr. Jones believes that for a man of his experience it will be as easy to catch the king of beasts with a lariat as it is to rope a Texas steer.

This opinion is shared by "Mike" Owens of Fredonia, Ariz., two of the best ropers in the west, whom Mr. Jones has selected to accompany him on the trip and to share in the profits that he expects to reap when he returns with a shipload of wild animals that have fallen victims to his prowess with the lasso.

As a fitting farewell on the eve of his departure Mr. Jones is to be tendered a banquet at Delmonico's tomorrow night, at which the menu will include buffalo steaks, bear meat and other delicacies that are supposed to tickle the palate of the western ranchman and hunter. Numbered among the hosts at the dinner will be "Buffalo Bill," "Falcone Bill," Charles M. Russell, the "cowboy artist," Ernest Thompson Seton, the writer, and William T. Hornaday, director of the Bronx zoo.

Major Young receives information of interest to members of the National Guard.

Major J. W. Young has received official notification that Sergt. Waddington of the United States Army has been assigned to the Asheville companies of the North Carolina National Guard to conduct several weeks work of instruction of the officers and men. The assignment of Sergt. Waddington is made possible by the provisions of the Dick Bill which go into effect January 10, 1910 and he is expected to arrive here January 11.

The new equipment for the companies is expected to arrive here and be ready for distribution to the privates and officers by January 1. The new uniforms of the National Guard will be the same as that of the regulars in the U. S. Army.

The work taken up under direction of Sergt. Waddington will be special instruction to company commanders and non-commissioned officers. A special course of military map reading will be given, rifle practice, and company and battalion drill, while closed and extended order will also occupy part of the instruction.

This is really the beginning of military activity among the members of the North Carolina National Guard. The guard is under the direct supervision of the state officers, but likewise is at the command and under the direction and supervision of the United States department of military affairs, and the secretary of war. With the going into effect of the Dick Bill, a higher standard of proficiency will have to be maintained, and the special instructions are designed to bring the companies up to the proper standard. The members of the two Asheville companies, P and K, are enthusiastic over the coming new order of things, and their new uniforms and rifles. Company K is commanded by Capt. Bard, while Capt. Lindsey has charge of company F. The First Regiment band is under the supervision of Bandmaster C. N. Webster, while the military post at Asheville is in charge of Major L. W. Young.
