this they did, leaving Uncle Thomas, my grandmother and my sister at home; we were going out to spend a time with them, after business hours on Saturday; this seemed to cause his spirits to rise, and as it appeared that he always enjoyed the times when I was with him; he made special preparation, helping my sister with some chores about the house—and lastly prepared some walnuts for us.
"About 4:10 p. m. he started to the barn to do some feeding, as was usual with him, and about 4:30 p. m. my sister heard him pumping water and he had led a horse out to water him; at 4:50 p. m. my sister was in the yard and noticed that he had not turned the cattle into the cattle yard—and she started to the barn to do this; when she came into a small yard adjoining the barn she did not see Uncle Thomas—she went to the barn to call him to assist her and when she opened the large door she saw him hanging to a ladder which leads into a large hay mow, facing her; she rushed to him and tried to raise him—then grasped a large hedge knife and cut the rope—his lifeless body falling at her feet."
The many friends of Mr. Smiley here and in this vicinity were shocked to learn of the tragic event. Mr. Smiley during his residence in Asheville and also during his pastorate at Asheville, was a large circle of friends. He was a brilliant, scholarly and withal a most genial man—a man who, although carrying a heavy burden, was always cheerful, smiling and ever gave the warm, clinging handshake to friend and acquaintance. He was with The Gazette-News for quite a while and was a close friend of newspaper work to take up his ministerial labors and became pastor of the Methodist church at Weaverville. Mrs. Smiley died shortly before the annual Methodist conference at Hickory and Mr. Smiley went to conference almost completely broken down physically. He expected to be returned to the Weaverville charge and the decision of the presiding bishop to send him to another appointment was a disappointment. Mr. Smiley returned from conference and going to his home in Weaverville a few days later became unbalanced mentally. His condition showed no improvement and he was taken to his former home in Indiana with the hope that he would recover. His mental condition developed little change, however, and self-destruction evidently was uppermost with him, ending finally in suicide Saturday afternoon.

Particulars of Death of Rev. Thos. Smiley
He Had Attempted to Destroy Himself by Taking Acid Once Before.

Full particulars of the suicide near Connersville, Ind., Saturday afternoon of Rev. Thomas E. Smiley, mention of which was made in The Gazette-News yesterday afternoon, have been received here in a letter to a Weaverville friend from a nephew of Mr. Smiley. In the letter it was stated that Mr. Smiley once before had made an attempt to take his life by the use of carbolic acid, but the effort was frustrated. The funeral services will be conducted today or tomorrow with burial at Crown Hill cemetery, Indianapolis. In the course of the letter telling of the suicide of Mr. Smiley are the following facts:
"It is a sad message which I impart to you. Uncle Thomas E. Smiley is dead. He passed to his reward of labors here.
"On March 5, Saturday, uncle was in fine spirits, and he persuaded my father and mother to make a visit to Liberty, Ind., over Sunday, today, with some of my father's relatives;
