CAROLINA VS. VIRGINIA CHAMPIONSHIP GAMES

Much Interest Attaches to the Meets in Greensboro and Charlotte, April 8-9.

More than usual interest attaches here this year to the Carolina-Virginia championship baseball games. The first of the games will be played in Greensboro April 8, and the second in Charlotte April 9. The third game will be played at Charlottesville April 22. Larger crowds than ever before are expected at both Greensboro and Charlotte this year, since two of the most accessible points in central North Carolina have been selected. Charlotte, by concerted action, and with odds against her, managed to get the consent of the managers of the University of Virginia and University of North Carolina teams to

play the second game there. Charlotte recognizes that it has Greenboro's record as a college baseball town to beat and every effort is being made to get a large crowd. These are the big games in college baseball in this section of the south, and the rivalry is keen between Virginians and North Carolinians. It being looked on much in the attitude of one state against another. A number of Asheville people expect to witness the games.

Carolina promises to have a strong team in the field this year. Stewart, captain of the team, will be the principal pitcher, with Hedgepath and "Pie" Williams as pitchers and utility men. Hamilton, Carolina's first baseman, and ex-captain, is again with the team, while Duncan will play his second year at second sack, and Armstrong at third. Hackney will again cover center field, while Pape, Johnson and Nixon are trying for the other field positions. Bule, a new man, formerly with Davidson college, promises well for short. "Chat" Bivens of Trinity college fame, will play on Carolina this year. He is a member of the law school. Swink and Poole, two new men, are trying for catcher.
