CONVENTION DATE TWELFTH OF JULY

Asheville the Place—Executive Com-mittee Elects M. L. Shipman Chairman.

The democratic executive committee for the tenth congressional district at a meeting held at the Swan-manna hotel last night selected Asheville as the place for holding the nominating convention and Tuesday, July 12, as the date. M. L. Shipman of Henderson county, commissioner of labor and printing for North Carolina, was elected chairman of the executive committee to succeed W. T. Lee of Haywood, resigned. Mr. Lee is a candidate for the democratic nomination for corporation commissioner and resigned as chairman that he might give all his time to his personal campaign.

When a resolution was introduced by Judge E. C. Cooke fixing the same July 12 at noon and the place Asheville. The discussion was participated in by Sol Galtier of Rutherford and Walter E. Moore of Jackson, both candidates for the nomination and Judge Cooke. The resolution, however, was finally adopted and the convention will be held here.

After the time had passed for holding the convention had been determined Chairman Lee tendered his resignation as chairman, on motion of E. H. Desert of McDowell the resignation was accepted with regret. With the acceptance of Mr. Lee's resignation M. L. Shipman was unanimously chosen to succeed him. Mr. Shipman in accepting the chairmanship expressed his appreciation for the honor conferred upon him in a few well chosen words. Mr. Shipman is familiar with the work in the district, having been chairman of the executive committee, also former Congressman W. T. Crawford was elected last year.

The following resolution relative to the poll tax feature of the campaign was introduced by Judge Cooke and unanimously adopted.

Resolved, that the chairman of this committee is hereby empowered to arrange any and all details for the working of the meeting of poll taxes, and he is further instructed to arrange any and all details necessary for the proper carrying out of this resolution.

The motion Judge Cooke was named to arrange all the details for the holding of the convention.

Following are the members of the executive committee: E. C. Cooke of Swain, K. P. Tallum of Graham, Frank Reynolds of Rutherford, M. W. Hill of Cherokee, M. H. Hill of Polk, A. H. Harrison of Clay, T. W. Whitmore of Transylvania, A. M. Frye of Swain, E. H. Desert of McDowell, M. H. Moore of Macon, W. T. Lee of Haywood, M. L. Shipman of Henderson and Walter E. Moore of Jackson.

IMPUTATION ON OFFICER REBUKED BY THE COURT

Judge Scathingly Arraigns Clyde Melton, Convicted of Disorderly Conduct.

Judge Cooke in city police court just prior to imposing a fine of \$25 and costs on Clyde Melton, charged with disorderly conduct by the use of vulgar and profane language, rebuked the defendant in the most scathing manner that has perhaps ever been heard in city police court. It came out during the course of the trial that the defendant, prior to being arrested for disorderly conduct, was arrested by Patrolman Jones and Patrolman McConnell charged with aiding and abetting in the keeping of a low and lewdly house that after the first arrest Melton walked up and down Mountain street cursing the officers in the presence of several women at that section and said that he was going to prove that Patrolman Jones had come into one of the houses by the back door.

In referring to Officer Jones and the incident which Melton brought out on the witness stand, Judge Cooke said that such statements from "the lips of a man like Melton, who represented the scum of the earth," were not worth an instant's consideration; that officer Jones had an enviable

reputation as an officer and a man that he was an officer who discharged his duty fearlessly and that his reputation and standing could not be affected by anything that the defendant might say. Judge Cooke further rebuked officer Jones for keeping his temper under such provocation, saying that the officer must have felt like giving his accuser a sound thrashing. The court said that very frequently it was necessary for a policeman, who in good faith, was attempting to apprehend criminals of his stripe and caliber of the defendant, to take into back door, side window, back alley, in fact, just any way, Judge Cooke referred to the defendant's attitude as "a contemptuous and defiant attitude, vehement in his vituperation against the police department as a "suppurating sore on the body social." Robert R. Reynolds and J. Frazier Glenn, who appeared for Melton, made a statement in the presence of the court that they did not constitute for a moment their clients' accusation against Officer Jones. Melton gave notice of appeal from the judgment of the court and also an appeal from a fine of \$5 and costs imposed in a case where Melton was charged with aiding and abetting in the keeping of a disorderly house.

Under the initiative and referendum law nearly a score of measures will be submitted for the consideration of the electors of Oregon at the general election next November. Limited woman suffrage and state-wide prohibition are among the proposals to be voted on.
