**AN AGREEMENT IS TO BE SUBMITTED**

Matter of Right of Way Over Property of Whitney Power Company Before Judge Pritchard.

Hon. C. B. Watson and H. E. Fries, president of the Winston-Salem Southern Railroad company, and Receiver John S. Henderson and C. W. Smith of the Whitney company, and Burton Craig of Salisbury, counsel for the receivers, were before Judge Pritchard of the United States Circuit court in the matter of a right of way for the Southern Railroad company to cross the lands of the Whitney company near the power dam. After two sessions of the court and several conferences of counsel, the matter was left open for attorneys for both attorneys to draw up an agreement and submit to the court for approval. Practically all of the questions involved in the matter have been agreed upon with the exception of benefits and damages, if such arise, and the exact place of crossing the Yadkin river. The receivers raised the point yesterday that if the railroad placed its bridge at the point surveyed, it would damage some of the storage basins. This was answered by the railroad company that the damage would be practically nothing. The receivers' contention in the matter is that they doubt the right of the railroad company's charter to confer the right of eminent domain. They wish to reserve the property in the interest of the bondholders, or whoever possibly owns the property.

**TRANSYLVANIA IS IN LINE FOR REYNOLDS**

W. E. Brees, Jr. Says That the Voters of the County Favor Buncombe Man.

Senator W. E. Brees, Jr., former senator from Transylvania county, now mayor of Brevard, was in the city yesterday on business. Mr. Brees is now chairman of the democratic executive committee of Transylvania county and is one of the most enthusiastic and ardent democrats of the state. On being questioned in regard to the political situation he said: "Judging from observations made, the democrats of my county are very much interested in electing a democratic candidate in this judicial district. **S. WALDROP APPOINTED DEPUTY TO MR. LOGAN**

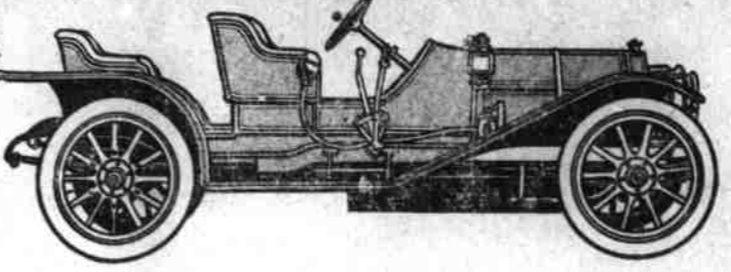
Succeeds Mr. Ramsey—Sworn in Yesterday—Will Make Asheville His Headquarters.

Samuel Waldrop of Asheville, who has spent the past five months in Jacksonville, Fla., and Alabama, returned to North Carolina yesterday and going to Charlotte was sworn in as deputy marshal under Marshal Logan to succeed Deputy Marshal E. S. Ramsey, resigned. Mr. Waldrop was named by Marshal Logan last Saturday and instructed to report for duty at once. He met Marshal Logan and Judge Boyd in Charlotte yesterday, was inducted into office and came on to Asheville to assume the duties of his new office. Deputy Marshal Waldrop will make Asheville headquarters as did Mr. Ramsey. He will be the deputy marshal for nine counties in western North Carolina, including Buncombe. Mr. Waldrop is well and favorably known in Asheville and his appointment as deputy marshal will bring pleasure to his hosts of friends. He is a labor union man and for years has been identified with the Plasterers' union and Central Labor Union of this place.
