REORGANIZATION OF POLICE FORCE

Police Commission Orders Department Divided into Three Shifts Effective August 1.

At a meeting of the police commission Saturday afternoon the plan of reorganization, recently approved by the board of aldermen, was discussed and after much argument the changes recommended were adopted, to go into effect August 1.

By these changes the office of sergeant was done away with and a desk clerk was created, whose duties it will be to remain at headquarters from 12:20 p. m. to 12:30 a. m., with an hour's intermission for supper, performing the duties of desk sergeant. His salary will be \$60 per month. Ex-Sergeant McDowell was made desk clerk.

The commission has prescribed that the chief of police shall keep regular office hours and remain at headquarters from 8:30 a. m. to 12:20 p. m., and from 6 p. m. to 7 p. m., to attend to all duties that may come up while he is there, and that the night watchman should be on hand from 12:20 a. m. to 8 a. m. to answer all telephone calls, according to the arrangements made by the board of aldermen.

In accordance with the original plan the whole force will be divided into three shifts with a captain for each. The first shift will be composed of five men with a captain, and shall be on duty from 12 at night until 8 o'clock in the morning. The second shift will have five men and a captain and will be on duty from 8 a. m. to 4 p. m. The last shift will have a captain and seven men and will remain on duty from 4 p. m. until 12 o'clock at night, thus completing the 24 hours.

Each squad will be on duty for the hours mentioned for one week, when a change will be made; but the evening shift will always have seven men, so that two men will be transferred to other shifts from week to week.

The chief and the captains will meet every week to choose their squads. Patrolman Lominac was elected captain of the new squad.

E. H. Williams, former desk sergeant, was elected a patrolman, and the place of Sergeant McDowell will be filled by F. L. Conder, a former member of the force. L. W. Young was also elected patrolman, and the resignations of Patrolmen Blackstock and Leavert were read and accepted.

GINSBERG WRITES MR. FINKELSTEIN

Man Who Made Away With \$800 in Diamonds Says He Is on His Way to Colorado.

Harry Finkelstein today received a letter mailed at St. Louis, July 22, from Julius Ginsberg, the man who made away with \$800 worth of diamonds which Mr. Finkelstein had let him have. Ginsberg says at the time that he had some prospective customers. The letter reads:

"I want to say I am on my way to Colorado and will be back in Asheville in about two months and pay you the amount. I want you to take my trunk down to the store. It is in a boarding house, 74 North Main street, and take care of it. Yours truly,

"JULIUS GINSBERG."

"P. S.—Very sorry I did not write sooner. Will write you a long letter shortly."

The letter, however, is not satisfactory to Mr. Finkelstein, who had greatly befriended Ginsberg, giving him several meals at his own home and doing everything to enable Ginsberg to make a living. Mr. Finkelstein says he took Ginsberg into the store simply to enable him to live here. He is making every effort to locate him and if he succeeds will bring him back here.

SPLENDID SEASON IS NOW PREDICTED

People from the Lowlands Are Flocking to the Mountains of Western North Carolina.

The people of the lowlands are coming in great crowds to the mountains at the present time. Every incoming train from the south and west is packed with people for Asheville and other western North Carolina resorts. The Southern Railway company believes that this will be one of the best seasons this section has ever enjoyed. Reports Saturday from the out of town places, as well as the city hotels and boarding houses, indicate that the hotels and boarding houses are being well filled.

The board of trade so far has received very few replies to the inquiries sent out as to special rates by boarding houses for the mountain excursion crowds which come for a ten days' stay from all southern points about the middle of August. The Southern Railway company will print and circulate the information in various cities if the people will only take the trouble of sending to the board of trade the number of guests they can accommodate and the rates which they will make for the ten days' stay. Without the boarding house and hotel people, however, taking the trouble of sending in this information, it cannot of course be obtained by the railway company and thus circulated. Attention should be given this immediately if they wish it to be used.

For the benefit of the American Women's league at Waynesville, it is announced that the local "tent" of that place will give a production of the play "Powhatan" at Waynesville July 27. The members of the cast have been hard at work and will doubtless give a good account of themselves next Wednesday. The Waynesville chapter of the league is in prosperous condition and hopes to be able soon to erect a chapter house.

Judge H. G. Connor in United States Circuit court today resumed the hearing of evidence in the big land suit of Gilbert against Hopkins. It will be possibly ten days before the case goes to the jury. There are 64,000 acres of valuable land in Graham county involved in the suit for judgment, valued at more than half a million dollars. This is perhaps one of the biggest tracts of land ever tried in western North Carolina.

News of the death of W. H. Jarvis at his home at Mars Hill, July 22, has reached the city. Mr. Jarvis was 70 years old and was prominent in his community where he had a large number of relatives and friends. His death was not unexpected, as he had been in bad health for several years. He leaves a widow and several children. Mr. Jarvis filled the office of magistrate in his precinct for many years, and "Squire Jarvis" was a well known man all over Madison county.

John Raymond Reilly, only child of Mr. and Mrs. M. J. Reilly, died at the home, 171 Charlotte street, at 10:30 o'clock Sunday morning, after an illness of two weeks. He was of a gentle disposition, loved by all who knew him, and will be sadly missed by his little companions. He was a pupil of Hillside convent and was a general favorite. The funeral services will be held Tuesday afternoon at 4 o'clock at St. Lawrence Catholic church. Interment will be at Riverside cemetery.

ASHEVILLE WILL HAVE PLACE AT EXPOSITION

Appalachian Exposition at Knoxville Will Be a Success—Mr. Cohen Coming.
