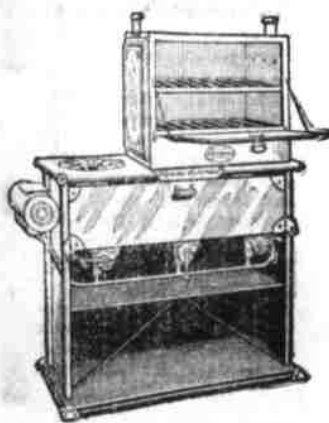

A PLAYGROUND FOR BAPTISTS

Blue Mont, an Essentially Religious and Essentially Baptist Mountain Summer Home Community.

A SITUATION SUPERB; WONDERFUL GROWTH

Tabernacle Dedicated Yesterday—Plans for a Lake—Landscape Work Done by Mr. Beadles.

Blue Mont is destined to become the summer playground of the Baptists of the southern states. Blue Mont is essentially a religious community, under control of the Southern Baptist assembly; it is a place for Baptists.

Although the development of the property has been the matter of only a little over a year, considerable has been done to transform the mountain side and valleys into habitable places. Some 45 cottages have already been constructed. The growth has been wonderful. There is a handsome administration building near the station, and Chestnut Heights hotel, constructed this season, conducted in a splendid manner by C. C. Ellzey. The developments are just beginning.

The property lies well for development. Much of the present holdings of the assembly was purchased from Mrs. Lydia Cheeseman, one of the oldest residents of western North Carolina. Her home was located near the mouth of the Swannanoa tunnel and her homestead will be preserved by the assembly as a landmark. The whole grounds have been laid out by C. D. Beadles of the Biltmore estate and the development is proceeding along the lines laid down by him.

The land lies on both sides of the railway track and is watered by an abundance of bold mountain springs—23 in number. Not a water course nor a spring can anyone purchase at Blue Mont. These are reserved by the company for the use of all. Along each watercourse a strip of land is reserved as a park. The elevation is from 2500 to 3225 feet.

"Lover's Lane" is a network of rhododendron with a cool spring in its midst, which forms a most attractive place for picnics. The whole grounds are ideal.

A System of Reservoirs. At the head of each of the streams it is planned to erect reservoirs and from them the lots along each stream can be supplied with water. An efficient yet inexpensive system can be inaugurated. Near the mouth of the Swannanoa tunnel and just a little above the present depot is the site for a lake which will probably be constructed within a short while. The basin will cover three or four acres.

The plan of development calls for the erection of at least one and perhaps two hotels. The more expensive hotel will be erected at a magnificent site in the Swannanoa gap. This is one of the finest building sites in the whole grounds and a magnificent view may be obtained. This hotel will probably be started within the next 12 months. The other hotel will probably be located near the station. The railway company has promised to erect an \$8000 station within a short while.

The Tabernacle. The tabernacle or auditorium which was begun last year was completed this summer and the formal dedication took place Sunday. The building is rounded in shape with high pitched roof, and possesses admirable acoustic properties. It has a seating capacity of about 1100 people. The seats are comfortable. Here it is that all of the meetings are held. Prominent lecturers address gatherings, various study classes hold their sessions, Sunday school is held, or a congregation gathers for preaching. It is centrally located.

In the tract more than 600 lots have been laid off, these lots containing each about half an acre and being 110 feet front by 220 deep. This gives a convenient sized lot. Some

200 lots have already been purchased at \$100 per lot. It is probable that the price will be advanced by the stockholders at their meeting Thursday to \$150.

Fifteen States Interested. In the number of lots purchased, Asheville people rank first, Kinston second and De Land, Fla., third. Lots have been purchased by people of 15 states. While essentially a Baptist community, the assembly, under conditions, would sell lots to members of other denominations. Dancing and card playing have no standing at Blue Mont. Two of the handsomest cottages on the grounds were completed this season. These are owned and occupied by F. H. McMillan and W. C. Jackson, two prominent men of De Land, Fla. Rev. Hight C. Moore, editor of the Biblical Recorder, has a cottage near the Swannanoa gap; Dr. and Mrs. Green, missionaries to China, have erected a cottage and are spending their vacation at Blue Mont—there are too many to mention here—this simply is given to give an example of Blue Mont's citizenship.

There are 400 acres of land reserved as parks while seven miles of streets are provided for. Three miles have already been graded. Mr. Beadles has got a fine grade to all points. The policy of the management is to grade roads to the various sections just as soon as the lot owner begins to build. Athletic grounds add a great feature to the assembly. Tennis courts, baseball diamonds, and track grounds supply places of exercise for those who desire. The athletic sports this season were quite a feature.

At the stockholders meeting Thursday laws and ordinances will be adopted to govern the village of Blue Mont. The directors meet Wednesday. The management has been untiring in its efforts to develop the property and to them much credit is due. The president is James H. Tucker of Asheville, a well known lawyer, while the general secretary is R. W. Spillman of Kinston, one of the best known Sunday school workers of the south. He has charge of the religious program. The general manager is E. L. Hon of De Land, who has been untiring in looking

carefully after the details of the grounds and developments. W. A. Ward of Asheville is secretary.

The board of directors consists of J. H. Tucker of Asheville, chairman; R. W. Spillman of Kinston, Dr. H. W. Battle of Virginia, M. L. Kester of the Thomasville orphanage, H. C. Moore of Raleigh, Judge J. C. Pritchard of Asheville, E. McKinnon Goodwin of Morganton, E. S. Davis of Asheville, J. M. Stoner of Asheville, E. L. Hon of De Land, Rev. T. P. Bell, D. D., of the Christian Index of Atlanta, J. D. Moore of Columbia, Rev. J. P. Sampey, D. D., of the Southern Baptist college, Louisville, D. M. Dew of Lynchburg.

The dedication of the tabernacle took place yesterday morning at 11 o'clock. The service was opened with prayer by Dr. T. W. Swope of Norfolk, followed by a solo, "My Home Land," by Miss Austin. The dedicatory sermon was preached by Dr. J. M. Frost of Nashville, one of the leaders in Baptist Sunday school work. Taking as his subject "Personal Belief in the Resurrection of Jesus," Dr. Frost preached an effective sermon. He illustrated his address by a number of concrete incidents which had led him to a belief in Christ's resurrection. The empty tomb of Christ, he declared, had made possible the building which was being dedicated. Following the address there was a song by the choir and a prayer by Rev. T. P. Bell, D. D. After another song, Rev. Mr. Freeman of Black Mountain pronounced the benediction. The meeting was attended by about 500 people, including a number from the surrounding country.
