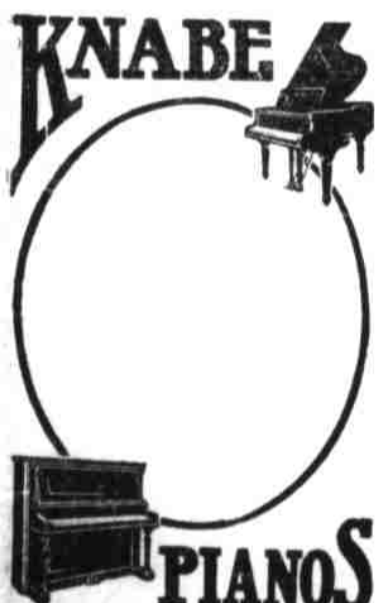

## GREAT SHOW, SAYS DIST. AGENT WOOD

Asheville Railway Official Returns from Knoxville and Is Greatly Pleased With Exposition.

### BOARDING HOUSES AND HOTELS MAINTAIN YEAR-ROUND RATES

Over 21,000 People Visited the Exposition the First Week—Amusement Features—Acroplane Ascents, Etc.

District Passenger Agent Wood says in regard to inquiries as to the Appalachian exposition at Knoxville.

He spent Saturday, September 17, visiting the Appalachian exposition at Knoxville. The street car service between the Southern railway station and the exposition grounds is excellent, cars running every few minutes direct from the Southern railway station to the exposition entrance. A charge of 5c is entitles visitors to all of the exposition exhibits proper of course a small charge is made to private exhibits within the grounds.

In the general exposition hall are found the various exhibits and general displays from all over the United States. A whole day may be spent in this building with the greatest interest. The United States government has a most attractive display in both this building and in the forestry building.

As an educational feature of the exposition, said agricultural possibilities of the south I have never seen anything that equals the display at this exposition. Manufactures, fruit and other displays predominate.

The mineral resources of the south are well known but a visitor will be surprised at the display of exhibits of minerals, precious stones, minerals, coal, salt, gravel, paving stones, oil, lime, cement, barite, kaolin, talc, mica, other industrial products which are displayed.

The fine arts and automobile and farming implements exhibits are up to date in every particular.

The special features of the exposition are the foundry exhibits of every character. Daily balloon ascensions with trip, parachute, trapeze and dirigible balloons and Wright biplane ascensions, wild west shows and the general class of novelties such as are shown at all exhibitions of this type are to be found.

From a fireworks requiring two special trains, moved from Milwaukee to Knoxville last week and are making healthful demonstrations of the fall of Pompeii and the "Battle of the Clouds." This alone is worth a trip to Knoxville.

There are ten large hotels and innumerable boarding houses in Knoxville, all of which are maintaining the regular in the year round commensurate and are handling the crowds in a proper way.

Over 21,000 people visited the exposition the first week it opened. A striking statement with the fact that all that is necessary is to find a resident of Knoxville in order that he may receive full information, not only in regard to the exposition, but also in all other points of interest in and around Knoxville.

The rates to Knoxville are unusually low and are \$4 to \$5 daily, good for the entire season, and on up the date as advertised in the papers and displayed on a banner in front of the Southern railway office. These rates apply from Asheville correspondingly low rates apply from all other points in the territory. There are three trains daily between Asheville and Knoxville.

The Knoxville Southern has gotten out a fine Appalachian Exposition edition and a number of the copies of this edition are passing the capes of this station at the Southern railway ticket office where they may be obtained by prospective exposition visitors.

An excursion from Shelby is scheduled to arrive here September 23, leaving Shelby at 8 o'clock in the morning. The train will leave at 6 o'clock the evening of September 21, allowing the visitors a night in Asheville.

Tomorrow evening at the First Baptist church five deacons will be ordained, making the number 17. The following are the new deacons to be ordained: S. Davis, Dr. R. J. Ferguson, H. J. Sauer, E. F. Truwood and Mr. Williams. The pastor and others will make addresses.

A special effort was made Sunday of the Y. M. C. A. song service for the new furnace. The sum of \$111.50 was raised. This will not be enough for the work to be done, so the directors have decided to have the rally effort run all next Sunday. In the meantime several of the envelopes will come in from the willing and anxious workers who are deeply interested in the future of this work.

A meeting of the board of trade directors was held this morning when W. D. Weatherford and F. K. Baker, who are pushing the Blue Ribbon and organization development of the Y. M. C. A., W. C. A. and Y. P. M. M., explained the plan of holding a campaign in all the cities of the south October 17-22 to raise the balance of the \$22,000. Asheville's part is \$1000 and it is believed it will be raised with ease. The directors heartily approved the plan.

M. C. Noland of the firm of Noland, Brown & Co., left yesterday afternoon for Norfolk where he will be joined today by M. D. Hardee of Henderson, president of the North Carolina Annual Directors and Embalmers Association. They will go by boat to New York thence to Detroit to attend the sessions of the National Funeral Directors association September 23 to October 1. Mr. Noland was elected by the state association as delegate to the national association. He will be gone about two weeks and will visit Niagara Falls and Canada before returning.

Powell will make the trip to Knoxville for Asheville day at the exposition, leaving here at 7:20 a. m. and arriving at 11:30. It is planned for a large number of people to go down that day to "whoop up Asheville" and by returning on train No. 26 next morning only one day will be lost from business. 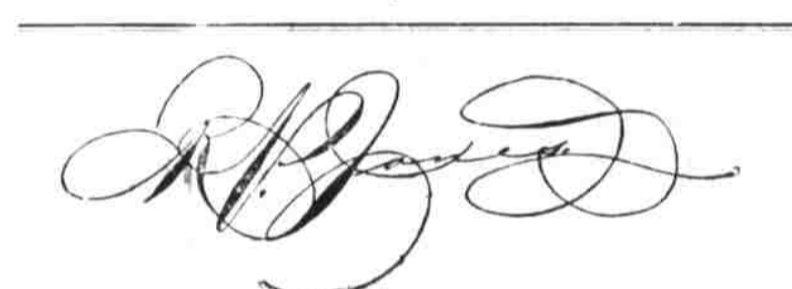
