PRISONER IS HERE FOR SAFE KEEPING
Maxby Would Have Been Lynched, It Was Feared, if Kept in Hendersonville.

Frank Maxby, a negro, was brought to the Buncombe county jail from Hendersonville yesterday afternoon for safe-keeping. Maxby, it is alleged, attempted to criminally assault a 10-year-old child near Flat Rock in Henderson county this week. He was captured by the father of the child and held for the officers. Later Maxby was taken to the county jail at Hendersonville, but as a result of threats of violence and the alleged assembling of a mob it was deemed wise to bring the man to Asheville. In fact, it was stated here today, had the negro remained in the Henderson county jail last night an effort would have been made to take him from the jail and lynch him. Maxby will be kept in the Buncombe county jail until the next term of Superior court for Henderson county, or until such time as the feeling in Henderson county abates.
