# Marketing for Big Circus Is Reduced to a Science

Some of the Items of the Bill of Fare—Ringling's Arrives Here on Twenty-Sixth Anniversary of Silver King, the Prize Beauty Horse.

A. L. Welsh, steward of Ringling Brothers' circus, arrived in Asheville early this morning, and today went shopping in the local market. He carried no a box car, but he accompanied by a box car, and he makes less fuss about buying food for 1250 people, with the biggest appetites in the world, than does the ordinary housewife who has but a family of two or six to look after. Welsh buys meat in the car load, and flour in barrel lots, vegetables by the wagon load, butter and lard by the ton, eggs in hundred lots, and milk by the barrel. He has ninety-three assistants and presides over seventy-five feet of steel racks, a butcher shop, bakery, grocery and confectionery plant. He has his business down to a science, and so systematic is he in making his purchases that scarcely a pound of meat, a loaf of bread or a can of vegetables is left over when night comes to close the next town. He takes no notes in his pocket with him but makes his selections according to what he sees displayed.

Napoleon said that an army traveled on its stomach, and the same is true of a big circus. It is no snap to cater to the appetites of more than 1200 people with tastes peculiar to twenty or thirty countries; yet Welsh goes away with his job with parties concerned. The Ringling Brothers believe it is a beautiful thing, and the busiest workman acts the same

## THE JURY AWARDS \$500 DAMAGE TO SCROGGINS

### Personal Injury Suit Against Southern—Verdict in Woodbury vs. Westall.

After hearing the evidence and argument in the case of J. J. Scroggin vs. Southern Railway company, lasting most of the morning, the jury in Superior court brought in a verdict by which the plaintiff was awarded \$500. In this case the plaintiff asked for \$1999 damages for injuries received while alighting from a train at Marshall in 1907. The complaint sets forth that the plaintiff boarded a train at Hot Springs with a ticket for Alexander; that he was told that he would have to stop at Marshall, as the train had not stop at Alexander; that he started to alight but before he did so the train was started and he was thrown to the ground and bruised, etc., on account of which the damages were asked. In the case of Woodbury vs. W. H. Westall & Co. a verdict was rendered in favor of the defendant company. The plaintiff was asking for damages for injuries received by falling through an elevator shaft in the building of the defendant.
