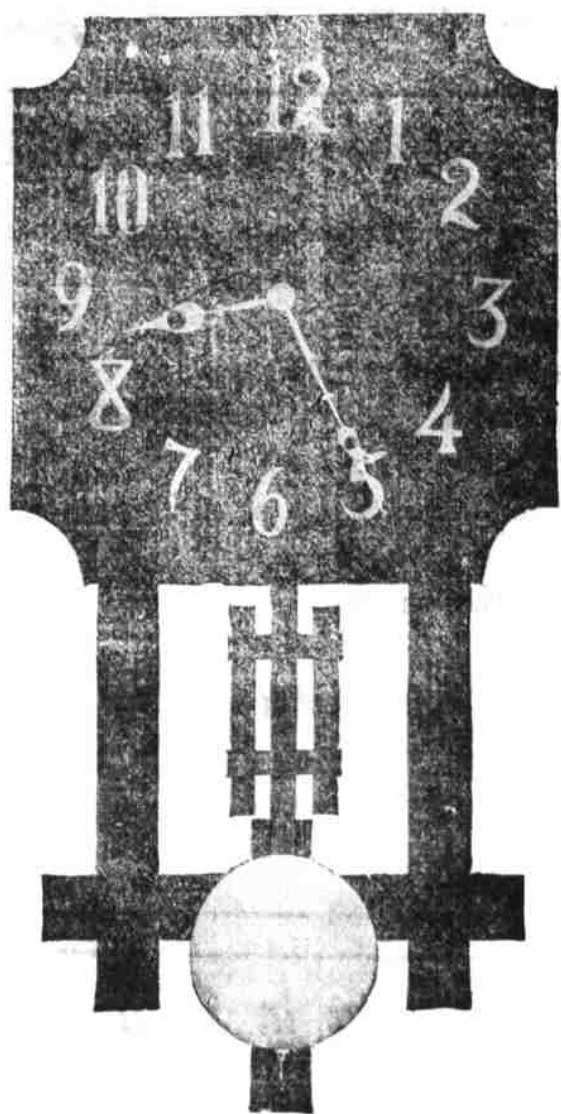

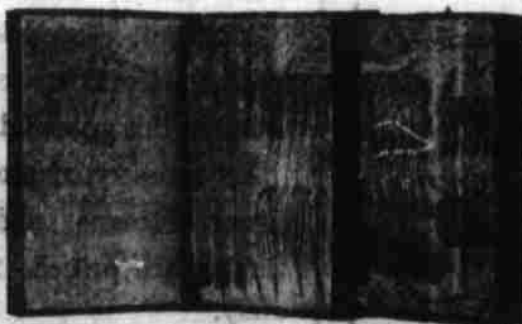

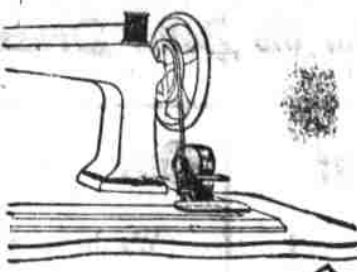

HINTS FOR THE BUSY HOUSEWIFE

Scissors Grinder Attachment
For Sewing Machines.



A very simple attachment for sewing machines has been invented which consists of a small grinding wheel mounted in a bracket which may be secured to the base plate of the machine. The belt of the sewing machine passes over a pulley carried by the grinding wheel, and a small roller serves to press the belt against the pulley so as to produce the requisite frictional engagement between the two. The device may be very quickly applied to a machine and used for sharpening scissors or any other small tool or implement.—Scientific American.

Cucumber Cream.

Put six ounces of the best almond oil into a double boiler. Cut four good sized clean cucumbers into small pieces. Do not remove the peel. When the oil begins to warm (do not let it boil) put the cucumbers into it. Place the boiler on the back of the range and let the water merely simmer four or five hours. Strain, but do not press, then to six ounces of the liquid add one ounce white wax and an ounce spermaceti. Heat wax and spermaceti in the liquid until melted.

Take off the fire and beat until nearly cold, adding during the heating process two teaspoonfuls of tincture of benzoin. Pour into small jars and cover when cold.

Apple Butter.

Two gallons sweet cider, one-half bushel tart apples (Baldwins preferred), a cup of sugar, three dessertspoonfuls cinnamon, three level teaspoonfuls cloves, one-half teaspoon allspice. Other spices may be used and more sugar if liked sweet. Boil the cider down to six quarts. Wash the apples, cut up and remove cores (do not pare) and add to the cider. Use a large kettle, as it swells at first and may boil over. Stir almost constantly and cook all day, or until smooth and dark red. Pass through a colander to remove skins. Add the spices and sugar near the last. This makes about seven quarts and will keep without sealing.

Household Notes.

Paint wooden pails and tubs with glycerin to prevent shrinking.
To test linen or silk wet a spot. If the moisture goes through, the linen or silk is pure.
To remove iron mold from marble rub the marble with a cut lemon dipped in common salt.
When frying mush dip the slices first in the white of an egg. This makes them crisp.
Never try any brass or silver polish on lacquered ware. It will mean relacquering it if you do.
Pickled Onions.
Peel small onions, cover with hot brine and let stand twenty-four hours. Drain and repeat with new brine. Make fresh brine and heat to boiling point, put in the onions and boil three minutes. Put in jars with bits of nance and bay leaf, peppers, cloves and slices of red pepper. Fill jars with hot vinegar, allowing one cup sugar to one gallon vinegar. Seal at once.
Fruit Cake That is Not Baked.
Half pound dates chopped fine, half pound figs, half pound citron, half pound seedless raisins, half pound walnut meat. Grind or chop all together fine, then roll it in wax paper and keep in a cool place. It is very nice and will keep a long time. It will be ready to eat in twenty-four hours after making. Do not bake it.
Scotch Shortbread.
Four cups of flour, one cup sugar, one-half cupful of butter, one egg. Beat butter and sugar to a cream, then beat in egg. Gradually mix in the flour. Turn out on to board and knead until smooth. Roll out to one-half inch thickness, place in shallow pans, prick top with a fork and bake in a moderate oven about half an hour. Cut while warm into serving pieces.

The Rug That Curls Up.

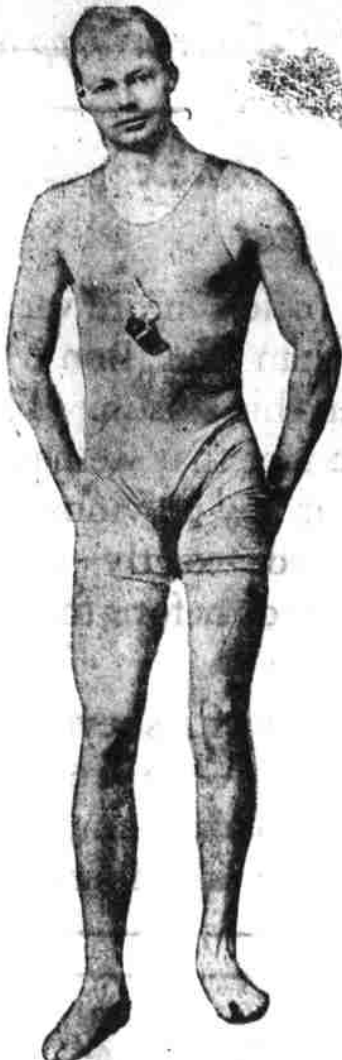

Apple and Horseradish Relish.
A delicious relish to serve with roast pork or other meats is made of mixing apple and horseradish. To two-thirds of apple chopped or ground fine add one-third grated horseradish. Add vinegar enough to make pleasantly acid and a little sugar to suit the taste. Bottle. This will keep all winter.

New Baseball War On.

The franchise in the Southern league held by the Montgomery (Ala.) club has been officially declared forfeited by President W. M. Kavanaugh following the failure of that club to pay a fine of \$1,250 assessed because of an alleged violation of the salary limit.

According to Montgomery officials, the next move will be recourse to the courts in an effort to secure the revocation of the franchise. However, the league president in a statement contends that the ousting of the club was in accordance with the requirements of the laws of the league and promises that the issue will be vigorously contested. Pitcher Herbert Judd of the 1910 Montgomery team advanced the charge of salary violation, alleging that he received \$25 a month in excess of what his contract called for, supplementing his assertion with affidavits.

New Motorboat Race.

There will be another race for the British international trophy for motorboats next year. After the last race, when the Dixie II, won through the accident to the Pioneer, owned by the Duke of Westminster, the international committee met and agreed on some changes in the deed of gift. One of these is that the match shall be two out of three races instead of just one. Other changes were suggested, and it was also thought that the deed of gift and all the conditions might be rewritten and expressed more clearly. These suggestions will be made to Lord Northcliffe, the donor of the cup, and he will doubtless agree to the changes suggested.

Beef Still Big Factor in Football.

Walter Camp is of the opinion that "beef" is still a powerful factor in the makeup of a winning football team notwithstanding the fact that the new rules provide for a more open game. "It is true that there is more chance for a light, fast man to make an eleven under the revised code than formerly," explained Mr. Camp, "but weight will still be a powerful factor in the line, and the light back will be working under a handicap in smashing into a defense of heavy forwards. Weight is still a potential factor in the makeup of a winning eleven, and those who contend that the new rules require players of 'beef' are partially right in their contention."

Great Bag Stealing Record.

William H. Zimmerman of Newark, N. J., who was one of the guardians of the outer garden for the Utica team of the New York State league, has 100 stolen bases credited to his account this year. By going over the hundred mark he has written his name in baseball history beside that of such old time heroes as Hamilton, Brown and Lange.

Arnet May Visit America.

Richard Arnet, who is to row a return match with Ernest Barry, the English champion, whom he beat in South Africa, in England, is expected to return home by way of America and is likely to row against Durrant or some other strong professional while in this country.
