Mr. Lynch Makes Statement.

Editor of The Gazette-News:
The article in yesterday morning's Citizen was very misleading inasmuch as it stated that the Grand Theater in Raleigh was closed and could not be reopened. One would infer from reading the article that the theater had gone in the hands of the receiver through my management. Nothing could be further from the facts. The Grand Theater company was organized a little over a year ago, and was capitalized at \$9000, \$8500 of which was paid in. Before finishing the theater they ran short of funds. They borrowed \$2500 from the Citizens National bank of Raleigh on October 14, 1909, for one year, making the note fall due October 14, 1910. The president of the Grand Theater company company wrote me to Columbia, where I have two theaters, asking me to come to Raleigh and see him, which I did the last of August. He went over the situation and told me that the company was in very bad shape, and he personally owned 1000 opera chairs which were in the building, and the Grand Theater company owed him an account of \$811.74. He made me a proposition to sell them to me, which I accepted. I ran the theater about four weeks and found that the company was hopelessly in debt and that should I put the theater on a good, paying basis others would derive the benefit instead of myself, and finding that I could not collect my account of \$811.74, as the Grand Theater company was insolvent, I immediately instructed my attorneys to bring suit against the Grand Theater company for the above amount. When I gave my attorneys these instructions they issued a summons to the Grand Theater company, which was about 8 o'clock in the evening. That night several of the Grand Theater company sent an automobile to Goldsboro to get an order from Judge Cook appointing a receiver to keep me from getting my judgment next morning for the money which they owed me. Their reason for so doing was to protect themselves from the bank note of \$2500. The receiver was appointed; I leased the house from the receiver and continued to run until after fair week.
My attorneys, Watson & Denson of Raleigh, advised me to close the house until final settlement of the matter, which I did. Although I continued to

Weaverville, Nov. 22.—Corn shucking season is here. A few years ago the practice of calling in all the neighbors to help shuck corn had almost died out in this section and even now it is not so common as it once was, but judging from the reports of shuckings that have been, and are to be, it is again gaining ground. No doubt there was a reason for the falling off of the practice as there is a reason for its return to favor—the fact that not so much corn was raised a few years ago as now. Then the corn acre leveled up, thrown into the burn and shucked as needed. Very often it ruined the corn and didn't do the shucks any good.
Not long ago a farmer, talking on the subject said that these old time shuckings should not be allowed to die out. That if and "shucking days" were the sole survivors of the "old days workings" when the whole neighborhood would gather at a certain hour and help to "raise" a barn, or per-
