MR.J.L.ALEXANDER WINS HIS LAWSUIT

Judge Webb Holds That LaBarbe, Moale & Chiles Has no Claim on Battery Park Lease.

The suits involving the lease of the Pattery Park hotel were quickly set-tled today when Judge Webb intimated that the evidence which had so far been introduced showed that LaBarbo, Moale & Chiles, who were suing for two-thirds interest in a five year lease now held by J. L. Alexander would not warrant the case going to the jury. This amounted to the plaintiffs in the suit of LaParbe. Moste & Chiles against J. L. Alexander and the Coxe estate losing out completely in their allegation that fraud had been per-J. L. Alexander. The suit of J. L. Alexander against Laliarbe, Moale & Thiles to settle up the partnership dell lease of the Pottery Park hotel running for 18 months was compromised by Mr. Alexander paying the defendants \$600. Each side is to pay their proportionate part of the costs The victory is a signal one for Mr

Alexander, who, incidentally made a line witness on the stand yesterday He was not placed on the stand toda to complete his examination, a settle ment of the suit being evident. Several years ago LaBarbe, Moal-

The hotel was under this joint manage ment for about 18 months and when it came to a new lease on the hote Mr. Alexander and LaBarbe, Moale & hiles each put in hids for the lease and Mr. Alexander's terms being re garded as better for the Coxe estate was accepted by the crustees. Alexander being unable to procure settlement of the old partnership brought suit to settle this. He state that he had at all times been rem to settle up the partnership. The LaParbe, Moule & Chiles Frought counter suit to obtain a share in the new lease of the hotel.
