Apple and Peach Crops Cut Off, Report Shows-All Grains Are in Fine Condition.

SOUTHERN ANNOUNCES SCHEDULE CHANGES

Goldsboro - Asheville Train Will Be Operated to Waynesville - Field Hospital Corps for Asheville.

Gazette-News Bureau. The Hotel Raleigh, Raleigh, June 5. State Horticulturist W. N. Hutt subitted his estimate of the fruit crop of North Carolina in a report today to the state board of agriculture. The report is based upon replies to about 500 circular letters which were mailed to fruit growers in all parts of the

Taking the state as a whole, the aple crop appears to be only about 33 er cent. There were replies from 66 ountles which grow apples. In none of the well-known apple anties is more than a 50 per cent crop reported. The best crops are re-ported in Alexander, Wilkes, Surry, Haywood, Buncombe, Henderson and ancey. The shortage of the crop is ue to the very cold weather in the pring, followed immediately after-

vards by hot dry weather. The people may find some consola tion, however, in the fact that the blackberry and persimmon crops are reported prosperous. There is only bout an eight per cent crop of pears, with peaches estimated at about 15 er cent. The grape crop is reported n fine condition and about an 80 per nt crop may be expected.

In the strawberry section, the cold eather of the spring, followed by a drought and hot weather cut the crop hort. However very satisfactory athered. The dewberry crop, now suming commercial proportions in ome of the eastern counties, is re-orted in good condition. Picking of he berries has just begun. Sampson unty's huckleberries also seem numered among the more promising

The cereal crops, such as corn heat, oats, etc., are reported in fine ndition in this state, but the dry weather in some places is holding the corn crop back a little. The tobacco crop will likely be a little short, while the cotton acreage is somewhat in-


