FRUIT SHORTAGE IN THIS STATE

Apple and Peach Crops Cut Off, Report Shows—All Grains Are in Fine Condition.

SOUTHERN ANNOUNCES SCHEDULE CHANGES

Goldsboro - Asheville Train Will Be Operated to Waynesville - Field Hospital Corps for Asheville.

State Horticulturist W. N. Hutt submitted his estimate of the fruit crop of North Carolina in a report today to the state board of agriculture. The report is based upon replies to about 1500 circular letters which were mailed to fruit growers in all parts of the state.

Taking the state as a whole, the apple crop appears to be only about 33 per cent. There were replies from 64 counties which grow apples. In none of the well-known apple growing counties is more than a 50 per cent crop reported. The best crops are reported in Alexander, Henderson, Surry, Yancey, Buncombe, Wilkes, Surry, and Yancey. The shortage of the crop is due to the very cold weather in the spring, followed immediately afterwards by hot dry weather.

The people may find some consolation, however, in the fact that the blackberry and persimmon crops are reported to be very satisfactory. There is only about an eight per cent crop of peaches, with peaches estimated at about 15 per cent. The grape crop is reported in fine condition and about an 80 per cent crop may be expected.

In the strawberry section, the cold weather of the spring, followed by a drought and hot weather cut the crop short. However very satisfactory crops were realized for the berries gathered. The dewberry crop, now assuming commercial proportions in some of the eastern counties, is reported in good condition. Picking of the berries has just begun. Sampson county's huckleberries also seem numbered among the more promising crops.

The cereal crops, such as corn, wheat, oats, etc., are reported in fine condition in this state. The dry weather in some places is holding the corn crop back a little. The tobacco crop will likely be a little short, while the cotton acreage is somewhat increased.

Southern Schedule Changes. Corporation Commissioner W. T. Lee has returned from Washington, where he went in connection with some proposed changes in the schedule of the Goldsboro-Asheville trains.

The Southern railway desired to hold train No. 22 at Asheville until the arrival of the Carolina Special from the west at 10:30 a. m., but the corporation commission felt that the corporation would be too late for the train to give satisfactory service from Greensboro to Goldsboro. The new schedule is to go into effect Monday, June 12, when the Goldsboro-Asheville trains go through to Waynesville. There will be no change in train No. 21, which leaves Goldsboro at 6:45 a. m. and arrives in Asheville at 7:40 p. m., connecting with the westbound Carolina Special for Knoxville, Cincinnati and the west. This train will leave Asheville at 7:50 p. m. and arrive in Waynesville at 8:15 p. m. Train No. 22 will leave Waynesville at 7:30 a. m. arrive in Asheville at 8:50 and leave at 9 a. m. for Goldsboro, arriving there at 8:30 p. m. From Asheville to Goldsboro the train will arrive exactly an hour later.

This gives a through train from Goldsboro to Waynesville that should be greatly appreciated by the public in eastern Carolina. Murphy division train No. 18, which two weeks ago was made to arrive in Asheville about an hour earlier, will resume its old schedule June 13 as follows: Leave Murphy at 11:30 a. m., arrive at Asheville 6:55 p. m. This may make a change in the Asheville-Bluemont schedule.

The Marion Telephone company was chartered to operate local exchanges in Marion and Old Fort and connections between these two; capital \$10,000; \$2000 paid in; W. D. Blanton, J. D. Blanton and W. McVall of Marion, incorporators.

Rifle Shoot Begins. Arrangements have been perfected for the prize rifle shoot which is to take place between the Asheville, Raleigh and Lumber Bridge company teams here this week. Monday is given over to practice shooting at the range, while the scoring will be done Tuesday and Wednesday. The Raleigh team holds the Dupont Trophy but is willing to let the winner of this shoot become the possessor of it. All three are fine teams, and each made a good score in the recent rifle shoots.

At a mass meeting of farmers at the court house, committees were appointed to go before the board of county commissioners Wednesday and urge that an election be called for some day in August, probably August 31, to determine whether Wake county is to establish a farm-life school. The county will probably be asked to vote \$25,000 in bonds and a special tax for the school maintenance to raise \$2500, the state giving an equal amount. Jesse Penny, a prosperous farmer of Swift Creek township, offered 25 acres of land for the school. There may be other offers when the matter shapes up better. The Wake farmers are very much interested in the proposed school.

Field Hospital Corps Planned. As a means of reorganizing the medical corps of the North Carolina National Guard, a field hospital corps is to be organized at Asheville and an ambulance corps will be organized and maintained at Raleigh. This decision was reached after a conference between Capt. D. H. Thomson, U. S. A., Surgeon-General S. Westray Battle and Adjutant General Lehnster. Such a step will put the medical corps on a much better footing, it is believed, and was brought about through the efforts, in part, of Col. Battle, who visited the war department at Washington some time ago.

Announcement is made that the North Carolina board of veterinarian examiners will hold the annual examination of candidates for license at the Hotel Guilford in Greensboro, June 17. The North Carolina State Veterinarian's association will also meet at that time and will be in session through the following day. Dr. W. G. Christmas of Raleigh, is secretary of the board.

The ladies of the Eastern Star are making arrangements for entertaining the Grand Lodge of the Eastern Star which meets in Masonic temple June 12. It is expected the meeting will be largely attended. It will be the first meeting of this body held in the Masonic temple here.

The directors of the state fair association have let the contract for a \$4800 poultry building which is to be completed in time for the state fair in October. This building will be 150 feet by 60 and will amply care for the poultry exhibits.

In the campaign which Insurance Commissioner Young is making for equipment of all buildings with proper fire escapes, he has just had published a number of blanks which officers are to use in sending out notice to provide fire escapes. These are ready for distribution. E. B. J.

Rush to Mountains Has Started Early

Hot Wave of Past Several Days Has Had Effect of Sending Visitors to This Section—Incoming Trains Bring Hundreds of Guests—Prosperous Season Indicated.

The hot wave that has been sweeping over the south for the past several days is having the effect of driving people from those sections to the mountains of western North Carolina this early in the season. Usually only a limited number of visitors to the mountains of this section leave their homes before the latter part of June or early in July but this year they have been coming in by the hundreds for the past few days. Inquiry at the railroad offices brought the statement that incoming trains from the south were bringing many people; that the destination of many was Asheville while many others went on to near-by resort towns or stopped en route. The officials of the Southern here say that numerous inquiries relative to hotel and boarding house accommodations in Asheville are being received from prospective visitors throughout the southern states while the board of trade is in receipt of many other inquiries relative to Asheville and accommodations. The railroad people say that they look for the greatest tourist travel to Asheville and western North Carolina this season than ever before, and further, that present indications point to the people from the extreme south spending a longer period of time in the mountains this year than previously. Asheville hotels and boarding houses are filling up while bookings for later in the season are being constantly made. The Southern railway has made more convenient its schedules for this summer than previously among the improved service items being the operation of a Pullman on the Murphy division.
