Mr. Cathey recently received the contract for this initial work and has purchased modern machinery with which to carry out his contract. The road will be graded 35 feet wide and made ready for macadam. The contract calls for its completion by August 25. The contractors will employ regularly between 25 and 50 hands on the work.
