ation and undoubtedly the tax assessing business is going to be an issue in the next campaign. The assessors for Wake county are Julian Lewis, O. S. Thompson and L. D. Womble, sr. Mr. Thompson it is stated, is a relative of the Tuckers, but of course it was not presumed that this would have affected his action.

Johnston County Reports.
The first county report to the corporation commission was Johnston county, which always boasts of being the first to settle its taxes with the state treasurer. The increase in the county is approximately \$3,050,000 and R. H. Grower, the county assessor, reports only two complaints at the board meeting. These were quickly adjusted. Mr. Grower was successful in finding 14,000 more acres of land in Johnston county than has been taxed previously.

The report for Halifax county next reached the commission. J. W. Pierce, the assessor, also doing quick work. The valuation in Halifax is \$10,872,931, an increase of \$2,318,885. Clarence Moore, a negro charged with breaking into a store in Sanford last week, was picked up here by the police yesterday. It seems that while in the store the negro put on a new suit of clothes and left his old ones in a pocket of which was a piece of paper on which was written "Miss Blanche Finch, 707 W. Lane street, Raleigh."

After ordering a special venire of 50 men to try the murder case against Willie Weaver, who killed a white man named Ed Pearce, Judge Peebles granted a motion for a continuance of the case until the September term of court and ordered the call for the venire cancelled.

In court yesterday Judge Peebles gave a negro named Lonnie Hall ten years in the penitentiary for highway robbery, the victim being John Harris. Ernest Jones, another negro, was found guilty of manslaughter and sentenced to four months on the roads. It seems that he was in a drunken row and shot at Richard Hopkins, the bullet wounding and hitting John Jeffrey, killing him.
