### COCHRAN AND MEYER GET INTO THE MAJOR LEAGUES

#### Philadelphia Gets Cochran By Draft While Meyer Goes to Chicago.

Cincinnati, O., Sept. 2.—One hundred and ten minor league ball players will become members of the major league clubs next season as the result of the drafting process before the national baseball commission yesterday. Of this number 63 will enter the National league while 47 will start their major league careers in the American league. The Brooklyn team of the National league and the Detroit and Cleveland clubs of the American league appear to have been the luckiest in the draw. Brooklyn obtained 16 players and 11 will go to Cleveland. While Detroit only secured nine, yet no less than four of the nine men were wanted by several other teams.

The number of players secured by each league club follows: National league—Brooklyn 16, New Cincinnati 10, Chicago 5, St. Louis 5, Philadelphia 5; Pittsburgh 9.

American league—Cleveland 11, Philadelphia 5, Detroit 9, Boston 5, St. Louis 4, Chicago 4, St. Louis 2, York 1.

Secretary Bruce stated that he had received checks from the American league for drafted players amounting to \$78,650 and from the National league \$108,400.

### JOHNSON CITY WON BY CLOSE SCORE OF 3 TO 2

#### Visitors Overcame a Lead of Two Runs After the Fifth Inning.

The Mountaineers lost a hard luck game at Riverdale park yesterday afternoon, the Soldiers from Johnson City winning out by a score of 3 to 2 after Asheville had gained a lead in five innings of two runs. Johnson City's run-getting didn't start until the sixth, when the Soldiers tied the score and then forced in another run in the seventh and won the game. Smith and McGeary, who worked for Asheville, and Herrick, the Soldiers' twirler, had an even break in hits, the teams securing seven safeties each. Four errors were chalked up against Asheville while the visitors made two.

The locals started the scoring in the third inning after Johnson City had been sent to the bench without a hit. Richards first up, hit safe to right field and scored when Sharp drove the ball into deep right for a couple of sacks. The side was then retired in quick order.

Asheville's second run was scored in the fifth after Bowers went out from pitcher to first. Richards made the score again on Sharp's timely hit. Richards sent up a pop fly and on error was safe at first. Sharp picked out a nice one and sent it to right field for another hit while Richards ooped home. Mullen struck out and Sibley went down at first.

The Soldiers started their run-getting in the sixth, two two-base hits following in quick succession. Alexander, first up, smacked the ball into the outer garden for a couple of sacks and Taylor followed with another two-base hit and Alexander scored. Landgraf sacrificed; Taylor advanced a third and on Hays' sacrifice scored.

With the score tied, the Mountaineers made a determined effort for another run in the seventh, but without result, while Johnson City got just what Asheville wanted. It happened his way: Shaw hit to infield, and Hays gained first on error at third. Alexander hit to center field and Shaw scored the winning run. Taylor came out at third; Landgraf fouled out, while Hays ended the agony by failure to connect with the ball.

Neither team was able to score in the eighth or ninth, although in the latter the hopes of the local fans were aroused when Woodward, first up, drove the ball to center field for no bases. There was considerable enthusiasm following this hit, but it soon ended when Waymack, batting for McGeary, hit to first and a double play was the result. Peaster struck out.

### PERFECTING PLANS FOR WINTER WORK

#### Y. M. C. A. Being Overhauled

##### —Improvements in the Gymnasium, Etc.

The officers of the local Y. M. C. A. are now busily engaged in perfecting plans for the fall and winter work and in overhauling the building, especially in the gymnasium, where extensive improvements are being made. A great deal of attention is also being given to the various classes and meetings for the winter and it is expected that at least 200 boys will be enrolled in the Bible classes and basketball league. The regular winter work is to begin the latter part of the month.

The work on the gymnasium is now going on, and it has just been provided with a ceiling and with 10 tungsten lights of 100 candle power each. The ceiling is finished in glazed white and at night when the lights are turned on it is almost as light as day. The basket and baseball lines are being repainted, the floor is to be re-waxed, the walls are being re-plastered, where it is needed, and they are to be coated with white kalsomine. The floor is to have a new coat of wax. The work is being done by Rhinehardt Brothers.

The bowling alleys will be closed during the middle of next week so that the alleys can be re-worked and put in their best condition for the winter. New pins are to be provided, also new score sheets; and a preparation has been ordered with which to re-surface the alleys. This is in preparation for the several tournaments which Secretary Brown is arranging with the associations of other towns.

The membership campaign is to begin October 1, and the Battery Park bank has promised 250 new card cases for this purpose.

Special attention is being given to the preparation for the Bible classes. There are to be several classes: one for boys who receive the benefits of the association free of charge, which will be taught by Probation Officer Gorham; one for the Montford club, and a series of classes for the 16 teams of the basketball league, which will require 16 teachers. There will also be a teachers' training class, and the regular Thursday night class to be taught by Judge Pritchard, besides the class for dormitory men, taught by F. A. Hawley. The educational classes will start toward the last of the month.

The boys' orchestra will play not only for the boys' meetings but for the men's meetings on Sunday, under the direction of W. E. Collins. Prof. E. R. Simson will play the piano at these meetings.

The schedule of the gymnasium classes will be made out by Physical Director Dill in a few days.
