ALL IN READINESS FOR BIG LABOR DAY

Business Houses and Banks to Close Monday and Aid in Celebration

SPORTS AT RIVERSIDE; BALL GAME, MUSIC, ETC.

Parade Will Start at Auditorium—Many Firms Will Be Represented.

Everything is in readiness for the celebration of Labor day here Monday. The program of sports is complete; the floats that the business men of Asheville will have in the parade are being made ready; the merchants of the town will close their places of business; the financial institutions will close their doors for the day and labor will be given a holiday. Indications are that the celebration will be the most generously observed of any previous affair. The parade bids fair to be interesting, while the sports at Riverside park during the day, with a couple of ball games thrown in for good measure, will doubtless attract great crowds. One of the added features of the affair will be a band concert in the afternoon at Riverside before the ball game.

J. F. Smith, chairman of the Central Labor Union committee, and his assistants have the arrangements for the day in charge, worked industriously to make the day a big success, and present indications are that the plans of the committee will be carried out without a hitch and that the day will be one of the most enjoyable of the season.

Many Asheville firms will have floats in the parade that will pass over the principal streets of the town Monday morning, while still other business firms will be represented in the parade in some manner. The parade will start from the Auditorium at 10 o'clock and will go out Haywood street, and moving west to Patton avenue, east on Patton avenue to Church street, south on Church street to Willow, east on Willow to South Main, north on South Main to Pack square, around the Square to Patton avenue, west on Patton avenue to Haywood and to the Auditorium and disperse.

The program at Riverside park calls for a ball game between Asheville and Cleveland at 11 o'clock in the morning and another game at 4 o'clock in the afternoon. At 2 o'clock in the afternoon the sports at the park will begin and will include: Men's foot race, first and second prizes; boys' foot race, first and second prizes; girls' foot race, first and second prizes; polo walking contest, first and second prizes; boat race, first and second prizes; swimming race, first and second prizes.

Then follows a band concert, and at 4 o'clock Asheville and Cleveland will start the second ball game. In the evening there will be music, moving pictures and fireworks.

Capt. Jack Robinson will be chief marshal of the parade, while his assistants will include J. B. Dalton, Frank Lindsey, Dr. L. B. McBrayer and L. W. Glaser. A prize of \$10 is offered for the best float in the parade and a second of \$5.
