DEFER ACTION ON CITY LABORATORY

Matter Is Referred to Mayor and the Sanitary Committee for Report.

Several matters of importance were before the aldermen at their meeting last night. There was a meeting of the aldermen and the city health board, at which the recommendation of the health board, that a city laboratory be established, was considered, but no definite action was taken. Dr. L. B. McBrayer strongly urged that this laboratory be established and showed the necessity that the city be provided for in this way, as already there is a great deal of this work being done, but that the present arrangements cannot be continued. Dr. Dunn has been doing the work but he stated that he cannot keep it up, as he has not the time to do so, and he too spoke of the necessity that some provision be made to have laboratory tests made. The matter was finally referred to the mayor and the committee on sanitation for a report at the next meeting.

After the adjournment of the joint meeting the aldermen elected Patrolman Sprouse to the police captaincy, left vacant by the resignation of Police Captain Jordan. He is to begin his duties September 15.

With reference to the charges of remissness of duty made by H. F. Claudius against Building Inspector Caleb Leonard, the board acted on the recommendation of the committee to which the matter was referred for investigation, and exonerated Mr. Leonard.

Chairman Fitzpatrick of the police committee made his report in regard to the fine of Patrolman Sprouse, by the committee, for smoking on duty, and the report was adopted. Patrolman Sprouse did not appeal from the ruling. He made a statement about the matter, substantially as was printed in The Gazette-News Thursday, that Patrolman Sprouse was in the corridor leading from the court room when seen smoking, that he only did his duty in his action; also that Patrolman Sprouse has admitted that he violated the rules.

The report of the street committee that Oak park be not accepted as a street was adopted because it would be expensive to grade and is not greatly needed by the city. The proposition to extend Seney street to Ocal street was referred to the street committee.

Proclamation Officer Gorham made his report. The ordinance, permitting the North Carolina Electric company to extend its franchise 20 years, passed its first reading.

To the market house committee were referred the claims of a number of tenants for concessions, by reason of inconvenience on account of remodeling the city court room.

The Asheville Motor club has filed objection to the \$2 automobile tax on the ground that it is unconstitutional and this was referred to Corporation Counsel Glenn.

There was a petition from some of the colored residents of Mountain street asking for more police protection, which was referred to the chief of police.

M. H. Kelly received the contract to lay a water line through the Ravencroft property, on the lowest bid. The J. H. Cathey Construction company received the contract for laying 1000 to 5000 yards of concrete sidewalk at \$1.12 per yard. The contract for feed stuff was awarded to J. T. Baird, and for hay to the Asheville Grocery company; these to be for the sanitary department.

The following sidewalks were ordered: Six foot concrete sidewalk on the east side of Furman avenue from College to Baird streets; on the north side of West Chestnut, from Flint to Montford; a five foot sidewalk on the southeast side of Jefferson drive, from Park avenue to West Haywood. The petition for a sidewalk on Blanton street was referred to the street committee.

The auditor recommended that the clerk in the sanitary department be named as cashier, with a bond of \$1500, and this was ordered. The following building permits were granted: C. Blanton, two-room addition to house on Blanton street, estimated cost, \$400.

M. O. Miller, six-room residence on South Grove street, estimated cost, \$600.

R. A. Pass, two four-room residences on South Grove street, estimated cost \$850 each.

Mrs. W. A. Boyce, four-room residence on Hill street, estimated cost, \$1000.

MRS. M. J. BALLEW

Widow of Maj. J. R. Ballew Dies at the Age of 78—Funeral Was Held This Afternoon.

Mrs. Mattie J. Ballew, widow of Maj. J. R. Ballew, died yesterday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock after a lingering illness, aged 78 years. The funeral services were conducted from the residence of Capt. Wakefield, 195 French Broad avenue, at 3 o'clock this afternoon. The interment was at the West Asheville cemetery. Surviving are two children: W. P. Ballew and Mrs. Laura Trivett of Asheville.

Mrs. Ballew was the mother of W. Ballew, familiarly known as "Pitt" Ballew by many people in Asheville, he was also the grandmother of the late "Buck" Trivett, who was shot and killed recently by his uncle "Pitt" Ballew. Mrs. Ballew, the mother and grandmother, was on her sick bed at the time of the fatal shooting. It will be remembered that the shooting occurred in her bedroom; that "Buck" Trivett, a nephew of Mr. Ballew, entered the room and a row ensued whereupon Mr. Ballew drew his pistol and shot Trivett several times, inflicting mortal wounds.
