FIFTY-THREE SEIZURES OF ILLICIT DISTILLERIES

Reports Show Revenue Officers Have Been Active During August.

According to the report of Revenue Agent Sams, which has just been compiled for the month of August there were 53 seizures of illicit distilleries by the revenue officers during that month. As the result of these seizures there have been 10 arrests and 68 prosecutions were recommended. The special taxes collected amounted to \$1186. Of the seizures made, 25 were in North Carolina, 23 in Virginia and 13 in Tennessee.

During the past few days reports have been received of seizures of one distillery in Graham county by Deputy Collector Shope, Special Employee Sams and Deputy Marshal Enstey, and one in Burke county by Deputy Collector Harkins and Special Employee Kanipe, with a number of possesmen.

Owing to the fact that neither was going very fast no one was hurt and only one of the machines was damaged. The damages on this were slight and were sustained by Mr. Jones' machine.

PLAINTIFF SUSTAINED

Black Mountain R. R. Co. Awarded \$80,000 by Superior Court of Yancey County. In the Superior court of Yancey county last week, the case of the Black Mountain Railway company vs. the Carolina Spruce company, C. S. Aldrich, C. A. Oberlin, L. E. Faulk and C. E. Perry was tried and a judgment for \$80,000 was awarded the plaintiff. The case occupied the time of the court for three days and the judgment was awarded by the jury late Saturday afternoon. Counsel for the defense included Gardner and Gardner of Burnsville and Judge Price and H. H. Shelton of Bristol. Those appearing for the defense were Huggins, Watson & Watson of Burnsville, Judge J. H. Merriam and Thomas S. Rollins of Asheville and S. E. N. Moore of Johnson City. The case was instituted in the Yancey Superior court last March, was removed to the United States Circuit court and was then remanded back to the original court by Judge Jeter C. Pritchard.

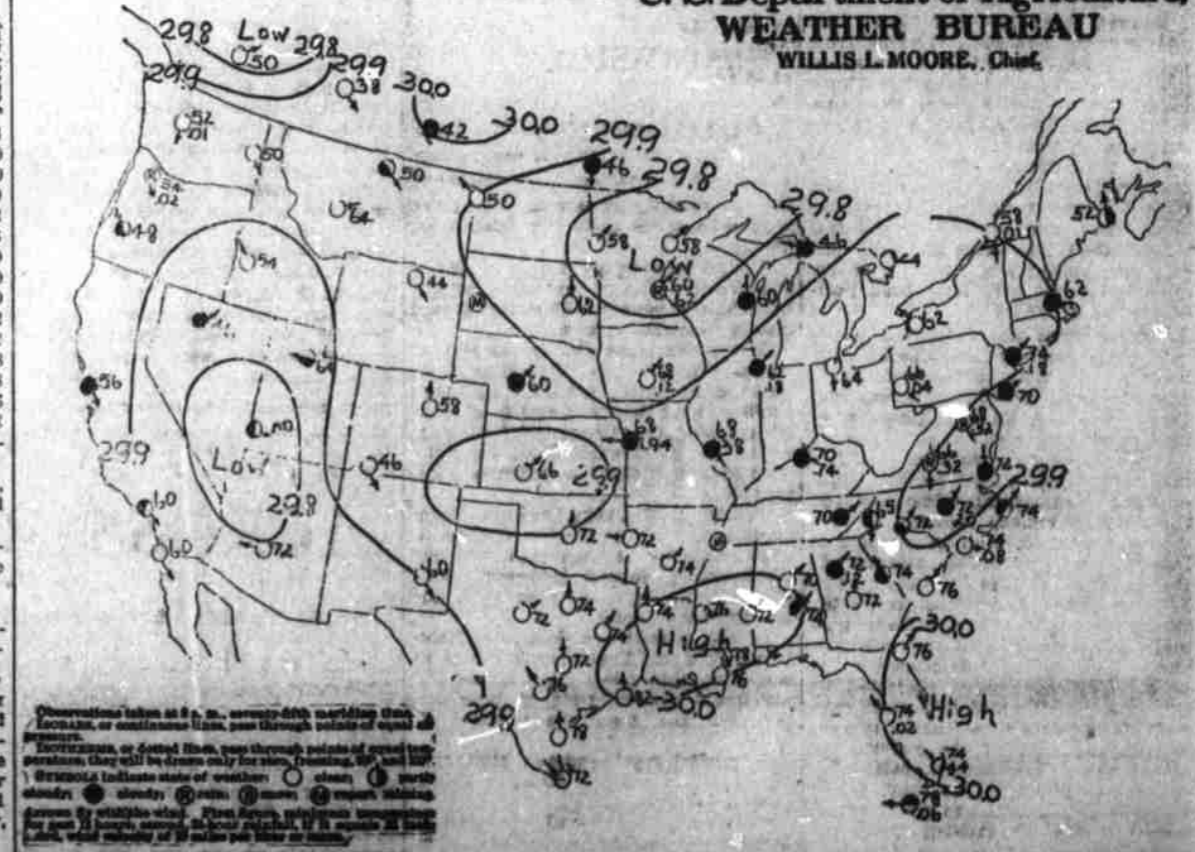
