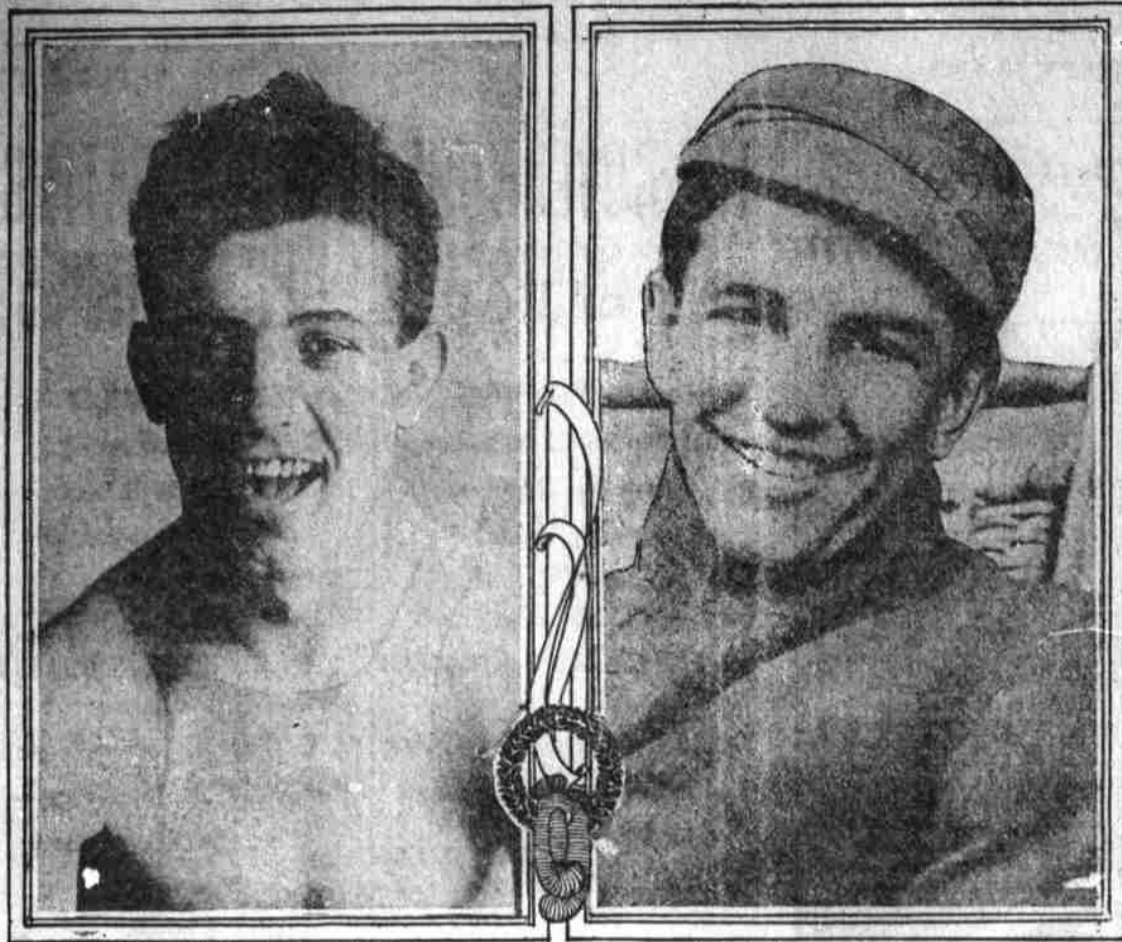


### Promoters of Wolgast--McFarland Meet Certain Contest Will Occur



Milwaukee, Wis., Sept. 12.—"The boxing contest between Lightweight Champion Ad Wolgast and Packey McFarland September 15 will be given as scheduled," said Matchmaker Frank Mulken after a conference with the promoters of the affair. Sheriff Arnold is just as confident that the contest will not be staged. "This does not mean," said the sheriff, "that the men will be permitted to fight and then be arrested. It means that Wolgast and McFarland will not fight in Milwaukee Friday. I shall prevent the fight taking place."

Wolgast took a day off in his training yesterday and after a short spin on the road early in the day he tipped the beam at 127 1/2 pounds. Governor to Keep Hands Off. Spring Lake, N. J., Sept. 12.—Gov. Francis E. McGovern of Wisconsin declared last night that he would not interfere in any way with plans for preventing or permitting the proposed Wolgast-McFarland fight in Milwaukee next Friday night. He was not in possession of information sufficient, he said, to enable him to act. "I am unable to say at long range

whether the exhibition will be a boxing match or a prize fight. Under the laws of Wisconsin a boxing match is not objectionable but prize fighting is prohibited. Practically all I know about this matter is what I have read in the newspapers and the accounts have been so conflicting that I should not wish to pass judgment on the question on the reports alone and at long range. Therefore I shall have to leave the question to be decided by the local authorities and Acting Governor Morris should he see fit to investigate it."

Further than this the company agreed to have their force of bill posters put up the fair lithographs all along the routes to be covered by the circus in this section. It is with regret that the officials of the fair learn that this particular circus is not to show here for the show managers evinced the desire to co-operate in every way possible with the fair association.

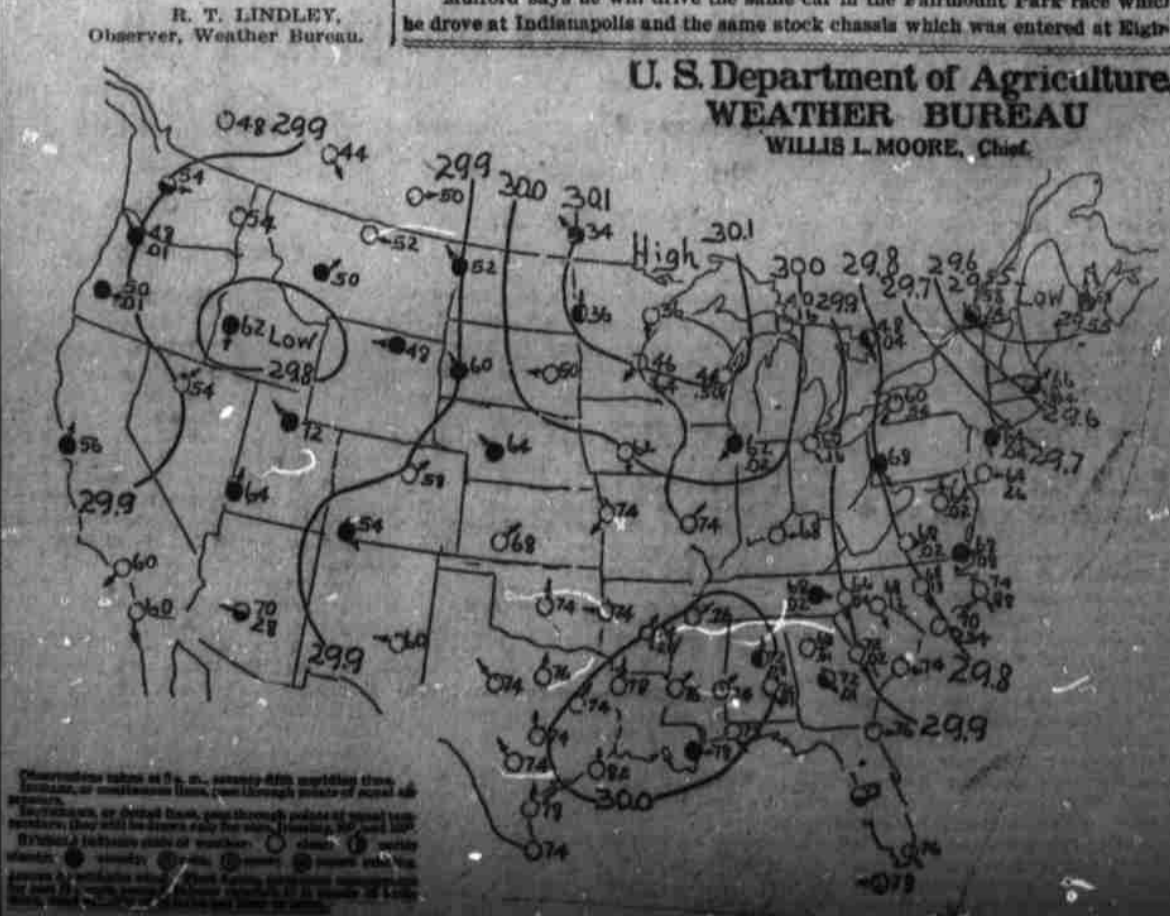
