DONIGS OF A DAY IN THE GATE CITY

Small Boy Killed—Bride Looking for Husband—\$500 More for G. F. College.

A fatal accident occurred in Greensboro yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock when a street sprinkler filled with water ran over and mortally injured a small negro boy named Keck. The accident occurred in front of the S. M. Maddox & Co. drug store, where the small victim was employed. It seems that the wagons stop in front of the store to fill the tank with water and the boy had formed a habit of swinging on and off of the sprinkler. Yesterday afternoon he made his last swing. He jumped on the wagon and started to get down by the driver. The wagon started off, the boy again leaped to get on, fell and the big wheels of the vehicle passed over his body. The boy, however, got to his feet and walked into the store and a first it was thought that he was uninjured. However, he sank to the floor and died within a few seconds after entering the store. The driver of the wagon went to police headquarters and reported the affair.

In Search of Her Husband.
Mrs. Ralph Pickett, a strikingly handsome young matron of 15 years and a bride of 25 days, came into Greensboro Thursday night from Burlington. Mrs. Pickett did not hesitate in the least telling newspaper men her mission. She was here in search of her 17 years old husband who left her Tuesday morning and who has not since been seen. Mrs. Pickett said she was married away from home because her father objected to her lover.

When asked if she meant that the man away and were married Mrs. Pickett replied yes; that they went to Clayton, and continuing remarks, "and it seems that he is still in the running humor." She appeared anxious that it appear in print that her husband was stoutly built; that he wore a cap and that everything would be all right if he would return home. She said that she and her husband had quarreled and so far as she knew there was no cause for the youth's bridegroom leaving. With a medley of sort of air Mrs. Pickett declared that husbands are a whole lot harder to keep than to get.

Tearing Down the Auditorium.
An interesting bit of "destruction" is going on in Greensboro at this time. The work of "destruction" is the tearing down of the mammoth auditorium that was purchased by Greensboro several years ago from the Jamestown exposition management for \$18,000. It was sold to Columbia, S. C., for \$5,500. It is understood that the purchase of the immense steel and sheet-iron structure has agreed to pay \$10,000 for its removal to Columbia and being sent up. It was in this structure that President Taft, then secretary of war and candidate for the republican nomination for president made his famous speech criticizing the republicans of North Carolina. Incidentally when the sheet metal roof was removed yesterday afternoon there were all fragments of the red, white and blue decorations clinging to the support and ceiling placed there by the republicans in honor of the distinguished citizens who scored members of his and their party in North Carolina.

Gift for G. F. College.
Much pleasure will be felt by Methodists in North Carolina over the announcement made today by Rev. W. M. Curtis, who is chairman of the committee from the Greensboro Female college having in charge the soliciting of funds for erecting a new \$25,000 dormitory of another gift to the fund. The gift was a check for \$500 from Hon. Ashley Horne of Clayton. Recently W. J. Fitzgerald, a farmer of Davidson county, made a donation to the new building fund of \$10,000 and with Mr. Horne's gift there remains only about \$7500 to raise.

A PECULIAR SITUATION IN AN OLD LIQUOR CASE

X. Lange, Acquitted in Police Court Grand Jury Presentment Lost.

Day before yesterday X. B. Lange was prosecuted in police court on the charge of retailing whiskey. Ed. Moore, the prosecuting witness, testified that he had bought whiskey from the defendant but that the last purchase was made in August, 1909. On that testimony Lange was found not guilty, the act being barred by the statute of limitations. That would seem to end the matter, but Moore also testified that he had made the same statement to the grand jury during the criminal term of Superior court in May.

That statement brought up two questions: If Moore made that statement to the grand jury, was there a presentment made against Lange? and if such presentment was made, would it still be valid and could Lange be prosecuted in the case in Superior court?

An investigation has been made concerning the facts in the case and it is found that a presentment was made and turned over to the clerk of the court. This was done at the May term, and at the July term the presentment was looked for, in order to bring the case up, but could not be found, probably having been lost. Search has since been made for it also, but it has never been found.

Col. Lusk, who prosecuted the case for the state, stated that when Solicitor Reynolds returns from the Madison county court he is going to have him make another thorough search through all his papers and see if the missing document can not be found. When asked about its validity, Col. Lusk stated that it would be good for all time, since the action was taken before the statute of limitations became operative; that the case in police court would be considered as a *non pro*, because this court would have no jurisdiction in the matter if the higher court presentment could be found; likewise, that the case could be tried in a higher court anyway, for the second time. He also stated that the action was brought in the lower court because the presentment was apparently lost and it was hoped that a conviction could be procured there. Owing to the outcome there, the further prosecution of the case depends upon the finding of the lost presentment.
