Price of Rice Goes Up.

Natchez, Miss., Sept. 19.—Honduras and Japan rice will advance in price an average of 25 cents a bag on Sept. 20, according to advices received by F. D. Brown, president of the Mississippi River Rice Growers' association, from A. C. Wilkins, secretary and general manager of the Southern Rice Growers' association.

Except in the vicinity of Houston, Tex., and west of that city harvest prospects are poor, according to Mr. Wilkins.

The Carolina rice crop has been practically wiped out, he says, and calls attention to the high price of the foreign cereal.

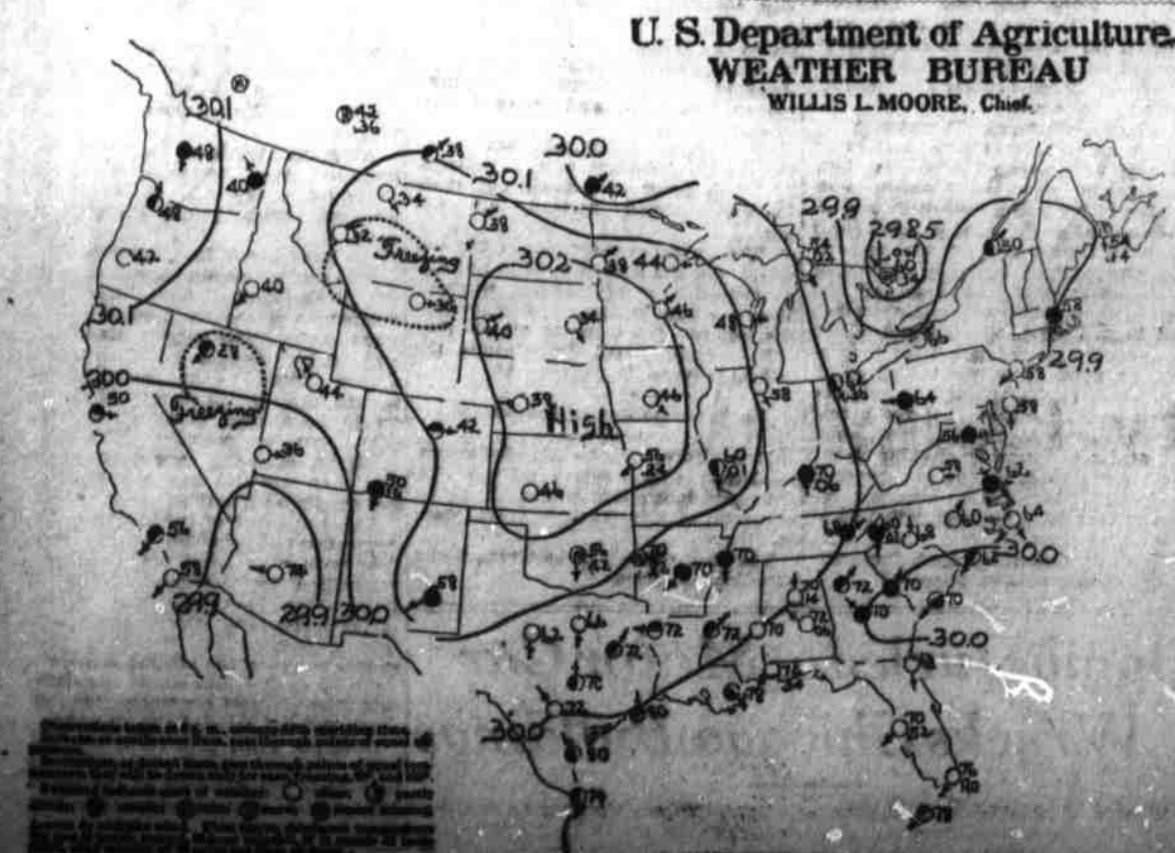
