TRIAL OF SETH WOODS IS TO BEGIN TOMORROW

He Is Charged with the Killing of Col. Stamey at Canton Some Months Ago.

Special to The Gazette-News. Waynesville, Sept. 25.—In the criminal term of Superior court this morning Seth Woods, the 19-year-old boy who is charged with the killing of Col. Stamey at Canton some months ago, was arraigned for trial. The case is set for 10 o'clock tomorrow and a special venire of 100 men has been ordered. Woods is represented by Crawford and Hannah and Mr. Smithers.

Harley Davis, the white man who is charged with burglary at Canton, was also arraigned and the trial set for Friday at 10 o'clock, a venire of 75 men having been ordered.

The time for the trial of Taylor Love, the negro who is charged with killing another negro named Morehead at Hazelwood, by shooting him through the window of the house of Jeff Lackey, has not been set, but he was arraigned this morning.
