Boone, together with the board of directors, have worked hard for the Haywood county fair which is to be held at Waynesville, October 3-6 inclusive. The result is that this is going to be a great success, both in attendance and exhibits.

The Haywood County fair is seven years old, is growing bigger and better as the years go by, and the coming one next week will distance all others in the years now gone. It is the one big, great fair of all western North Carolina. Here will be found the finest horses, best cattle, biggest and best hogs, finest sheep, gamest chickens, greatest and most varied agricultural exhibits, handsomest men, prettiest ladies, sweetest babies, biggest and best apples, in fact and in short, the very best of everything that the grand and glorious success. But the best thing has been omitted. Everybody loves a good horse race, and old Haywood, "sure goes some" along this line. This year the races will be even better than heretofore, and that is saying a great deal. Beside Col. W. C. Coll's string of swift steeds, there will be here about two score of fine winners, trotters and pacers from Tennessee and Kentucky stables. There will surely be something doing on the splendid, oblong, half-mile race track this year, and it will be no surprise should some miles be made in the fast time of 2:12 to 2:15.

## LIGHTNING STRIKES SWANN RESIDENCE

Mr. Swann's Arm Singed, Mrs. Swann, with Baby, Is Knocked Down.

The house of Howell Swann, near Weaverville, was struck by lightning last night during the thunderstorm which visited this section and Mr. Swann and members of his family narrowly escaped serious injury. One of Mr. Swann's arms was singed and his wife and baby were knocked down. The lightning struck the corner of the house and several shingles were knocked off.

Mr. Swann was lying in bed, when the bolt struck, with his arm on the sewing machine, which was near the bed. His wife was walking toward the bed and fell to the floor. Other than the shock they were not hurt but Mr. Swann complained of a stiffness in his arm today. One of his children, asleep in bed, was not awakened.

Mr. Swann stated that the flash was blinding and he thought the whole house was on fire.

## TARIFF BOARD CHAIRMAN TELLS OF ITS METHODS

How They Went About Reaching Conclusions as to the Schedules.

Manchester, Vt., Sept. 30.—In the course of an address on the work of the tariff board, of which he is chairman, Prof. Henry C. Emery of Washington, D. C., told the members of the National Association of Cotton Manufacturers how he and his colleagues had reached their conclusions, particularly in regard to the tariff on yarns and staple cotton goods.

"So far as these are concerned, we are confident that our results are accurate and furnish a thoroughly sound basis of comparison," he declared. "Our first problem was to establish certain general principles of cost accounting as a guide to all our investigations. The next problem was to adapt these general principles in detail to the peculiarities of a particular industry. This was done first for chemicals, then for pulp and paper, and finally for cotton. In the preparation of the cotton schedule some weeks were spent by our agents, including statisticians, cotton trade experts and accountants trained in cotton manufacturing in studying both the books and the processes at various mills and their results were submitted to the board for final revision. They may not exactly fit the cost according to methods of individual mills, but they come as near to meeting the requirements of the industry as a whole as is practically possible and have proved themselves easily adaptable to all mills using modern methods." The following resolution was adopted:

"Legislation changing the tariff should only be made after all the facts relating to the duty have been presented to furnish information. We urge that changes should not be made in any schedule until the information obtained by this body has been submitted to congress and given consideration. We deny that our industry is over-capitalized or that the return on the actual capital invested is ever has been excessive or that there is any trust or combination in any branch of the business."

Agricultural Demonstrators Will Come Here, in Preference to Washington.

Weaver, county agricultural demonstrator, who was in Asheville yesterday, stated that he has just been informed that the meeting of the county agricultural demonstrators of this part of the state will be held in Asheville October 25, 26 and 27. The program for the meeting has not been arranged but Mr. Weaver stated that there will probably be some of the best farmers in the state in attendance at the meeting. C. R. Hudson, who directs the demonstrators all over the state, is expected to be present and also District Agent Millsaps, who is well known among the farmers of this section. It is also likely that the United States department of agriculture will send a representative.

There was some talk of having this meeting in Washington but it was finally decided that it would be better to come to Asheville.

FARMERS' SUPPLY CO. OFFICERS ARE ELECTED

Will Conduct Mercantile Business—Details Not Worked Out.

The Farmers' Co-operative and Educational union held a meeting this morning the primary purpose of which was to complete the organization of the Buncombe County Farmers' Union and Supply company, which is to be a commercial organization. The company recently received a charter to conduct a mercantile business with an authorized capital of \$25,000 and today the officers and directors were elected. They propose to conduct a store in the vicinity of the depot and to sell goods to the members of the organization and any others. The members have already subscribed \$2200 toward it.

They have not yet fully worked out the details of the proposition but it is likely that concessions will be made to the stockholders. They held another meeting this afternoon to consider the bonds of the officers.

Effort Is Being Made to Enlist Interest of All the Sunday Schools.

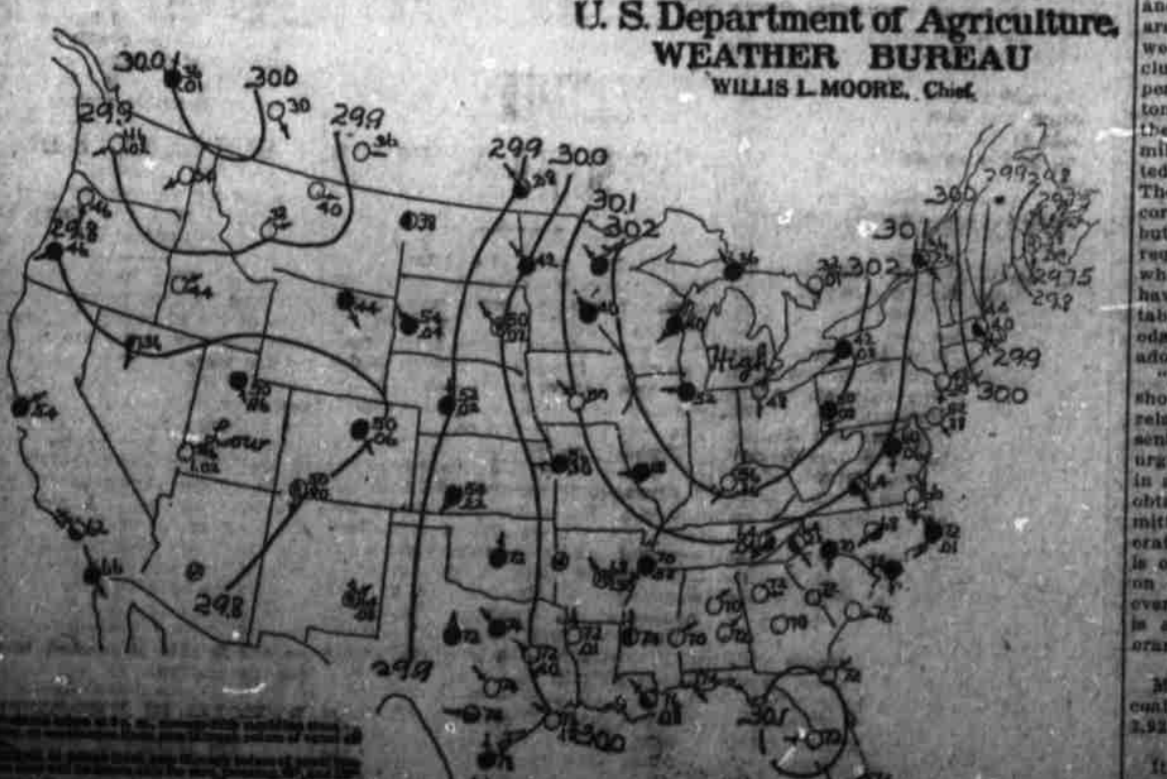
