however, from entries already made, that the display will be equally good as that at the Appalachian exposition in Knoxville.

The flower exhibits bid fair to be good, although not as full as could be wished.

The native wood exhibits will be rather short, although the section should furnish the best. It is stated, however, that the people in this line have been very hard to get interested.

The prospects for a mineral display are fair only. Some few exhibits have been entered and there are others, very fine collections, that may be entered this afternoon. If they are the display will be excellent.

The relic department also promises to be good and a great deal of interest has been shown by the school children in the pupils' exhibit.

There will be a very good exhibition of pantry supplies and a few exhibitors of home and its products.

Women's Department.
The women's work department will be one of the most interesting on the grounds. A great deal of interest has been displayed in this by the ladies of the city and county and the result of their labors will be a most interesting exhibit. There will likewise be a number of exhibits in the fine arts and handicraft department.

The final arrangements for the opening are being completed, and by 1:30 o'clock next Tuesday everything will be arranged so that the program will be through without a hitch. Chief Marshall L. E. Perry and First Assistant H. A. Wells have given out the following statement concerning the opening parade:

The parade of the Western North Carolina Fair association will form at the court house Tuesday, November 19, at 1:30 p. m. and will march via Pack square, Patton avenue, Haywood street and Montford avenue to the fair grounds at Riverside park.

The public and participants in the parade are requested to observe the following order of formation: Chief marshal and assistant marshals, officers of Western North Carolina Fair association and speakers of the day, the board of county commissioners and other officials of Buncombe county, the board of aldermen of the city of Asheville and other city officials, T. P. A. & T. C. S., the board of trade, Retail Merchants association, in carriages will form on the south side of College street, east of the court house.

First North Carolina Regiment band, military companies B and K, Fire department, clowns, ladies in calliopes, private carriages, horseback riders, displays will form on Vance street. The management of the Fair association desires that every one in Asheville and throughout western North Carolina will join in and make the parade the greatest western North Carolina has ever seen.

Class B of the Y. M. C. A. basket ball league began the season this morning with three games between the teams of Donahoe and Hunt, Scharte and Davis and Brown and Lance. "SHELLEY CASE RULE" IS FOLLOWED BY COURT

In Case of McEwin vs. Ball et al.—Superior Court Recessed at Noon.

Superior court took recess today at 12 o'clock until Monday morning, after hearing several motions. The jury was dismissed yesterday afternoon, with the conclusion of the city assessment cases.

Judge Lane rendered a very interesting decision this morning in the matter of McEwin vs. Ball et al. In this case a caveat had been filed to the will of M. L. Whitaker, deceased, and the court held that Susan Maggie McEwin, nee Whitaker, took the estate in fee under the doctrine known as the "rule in Shelley's case," an English case, which was tried about the fourteenth century. It is said that the Supreme court of North Carolina followed this case in the famous case of Staron vs. Hill, which went up from Asheville, in which the title to valuable property at Wood street and Patton avenue was involved.

On motion of the defendants, the case of A. E. Enesty vs. Sylvia Lottner company was removed to Jackson county on account of the convenience of witnesses and others.

In several cases where fire insurance companies are the defendants, they were allowed 60 days in which to file their complaints.
