#### RECEIVER NAMED

Asheville Hardware Company's Af-fairs Placed in Hands of J, E. Rankin by Court.

The Asheville Hardware company organized in 1897 for retail and wholesale trade, and which recently noved its place of business from Pack quare to North Main street, has gone into the hands of a receiver, Mayor J. E. Rankin having been appointed to this position yesterday by Judge

The application for a receiver was rought by the National State and City bank of Richmond as a creditor and W. R. Ellerson as a stockholder. The former is understood to be the largest creditor of the concern, the mount due them being about \$22,500. The total liabilities of the company are about \$90,000, it is said, and it is thought that the assets will fully over this amount.

Mayor Rankin will assume the re eivership at once, and if success is met with in getting good prices for the stock on hand and in collecting the debts of the company, it is certain that very little will be lost by the creditors.
