**THE JAIL CASES TO COME UP FIRST**

One of the First Will Be That of Roberts, for Embezzlement, the Solicitor Says.

**TRIAL OF DAUGHERTY FOR HAMBY'S MURDER**

Then the Liquor Cases, and After These, Perhaps, the Other Cases of Homicide.

Yesterday it was stated that there are four murder or manslaughter cases on the criminal docket of Superior court for the coming term, but as a matter of fact there are five, as there is a charge of manslaughter against Crawford Plemmons for killing little Linwood Bell a few days ago in an automobile accident. According to the arrangements of Solicitor Reynolds it is doubtful if more than one or two of these cases is reached, as there will be only two weeks of court. He announces it as his intention to take up the jail cases first, those cases in which the defendants are in prison, and he thought there would be about 50 of these before court convenes. Among the first of these to be taken up, he said, would be that against Frank Roberts, who is charged with embezzling.

After the jail cases are disposed of the case against Lawson Daugherty, charged with the murder of Milton Hamby, will be heard and following that, the whiskey cases against George Cathey, P. H. Thrash and W. H. Southern; then the other cases continued from the last case of the term of court.

If these are finished the new cases, in which the defendants are out on bond, will be tried and then the remaining murder or manslaughter cases.

**CORN CONTEST MEETING LIKELY TO BE CALLED**

Committee Will Meet One Day Next Week to Decide on Various Matters.

There will be a meeting of the corn contest committee on day next week, at which time important matters in this connection will be discussed. The committee consists of Geo. S. Powell, E. D. Weaver and Dr. A. S. Wheeler and they have charge both of the boys' and men's contests in this county.

Mr. Powell stated this morning that the committee would likely call a meeting of the men and boys in the contest and other farmers, also the school teachers, to be held some time soon for the purpose of awarding the prizes and to discuss the work and the results obtained by the contestants. He said that about 50 boys had qualified for the county contest and several men, and that most of the boys have qualified also for the state and United States contests and are entitled to compete for the prizes in all three contests. Mr. Powell thought the contestants are taking great interest in the work this year. So far no records have been received and it is not stated what prizes will be given.
