CATTLE WORTH FORTUNE, STREET RUMOR HAS IT

Nine Show Animals Killed on Train—No Claims Put in, Superintendent Says.

There are rumors concerning the blooded cattle that were killed Monday night in the derailment of a freight train near Terrell, to the effect that they were extremely valuable stock; in fact it is said that their owners considered them to be worth about \$10,000 each. As there were nine killed in the derailment, the damage will run into some money. No one can be found who seems to know just what they were valued at.

The cattle belonged to the farm of Phoenicia herd of Lexington, Ky., and had been at the fair at Richmond on exhibition. There were 12 in the car and included in the nine killed was a bull, said to have a pedigree of great length. The remaining cattle were shipped to Lexington, Route Agent Adams coming here yesterday for that purpose.

Inquiry at the office of the superintendent of the Southern railway this morning, as to the value of the cattle, brought forth the statement that as yet no claims had been filed, consequently no positive could be said as to the value, although it was thought probable that they might be rather valuable inasmuch as they had been exhibited at a fair, but it was not thought likely that they were worth \$10,000 each.

There seems little doubt that they were fine cattle but it may be set down as a certainty that their value had not decreased any since their death, in that they were killed on the railroad.

GOOD ROADS ASSOCIATION CONSIDERS STREET WORK

Wishes Estimates Made on Cost of Street Connecting With Sunset Drive.

The directors of the Buncombe County Good Roads association met yesterday afternoon in the council chamber of city hall and transacted the regular routine business. It was voted to call the attention of the board of aldermen to a number of places in the city streets which are badly in need of repairs; also the suggestion recently made that a road be built connecting the city street with Sunset drive. In respect to this they passed a motion asking the aldermen to instruct the city engineer to submit an estimate of the cost of such a road or the improvement of the present one.

A number of pictures were submitted to the board, which were recently taken by Herbert W. Felton, between Asheville and the summit of Mount Mitchell, and were accepted as material to be used in advertising Asheville as a resort town.

A full report was heard from F. Stukeleather of the meeting of the Appalachian Good Roads association at Roanoke the first of this month.

E. H. Egbert arrived in Asheville today from Montour Falls, N. Y., and will make this city his future home. He will open up a bakery business here shortly.

A suit has been instituted in Superior court in the case of Eugene Way vs. J. O. Fair at als. for the possession of two lots in the northern part of the city.

J. E. Rector returned today from Marshall, where he has been attending the Madison county court. He reports that the court is moving slowly, as the first case called has not yet been disposed of.

Rev. C. B. Waller, D. D., of Knoxville the new pastor of the First Baptist church, writes to one of the congregation that he will be here on the "Carolina Special" on Saturday, November 4.

The class for foreign pupils at the Y. M. C. A. night school has not started yet but probably will begin the last of this week. Pupils have already been enrolled and it is expected that a dozen or more will come in a short time.

It was stated in yesterday's Gazette-News that Dr. Henry W. Snyder, president of Wofford college, would deliver a lecture on Shakespeare at the Y. M. C. A. auditorium Friday evening. The lecture will be given in the High school auditorium.

A complaint has been filed in the office of the clerk of court in the case of F. S. Vaughn vs. A. B. and C. O. Case, in which judgment is asked for \$315, the face of a note, and interest, alleged to have been executed by the defendants to the plaintiff.

There will be a display of much basketball enthusiasm at the Y. M. C. A. tonight, when three matches will be played off between 7:15 and 8:15 o'clock. All who are interested in the game are invited to be present, and visitors will be provided with seats.

Company F, First infantry, N. C. N. G., will meet tomorrow night at 8 o'clock in the armory hall on Penland street to elect a first lieutenant, to fill the vacancy caused by the transfer of Lieut. Coleman to the ordnance staff. All members are requested to be present and bring equipment.

A message was received here yesterday by Chief of Police Lyster from W. A. McIntyre, formerly of Asheville, stating that he had been arrested in Greenville, S. C., on a murder charge. He was released later in the day. It is said that a murder was committed in Rutherford county in 1906 for which a Will McIntyre was wanted, and W. A. McIntyre was arrested instead.

The dispute about a cow trade between Larkin Bishop and Matt Andrews, which was aired yesterday before Magistrate James, was settled today, when the court decided that Andrews should pay Bishop \$10, the difference in the value of the cows. The court found that one cow was worth about \$2, and the other about \$12. Bishop alleged that Andrews traded him a sick cow.

Guy Weaver, as trustee, has sold the Cherokee land under deed of trust given by Joseph E. Johnson to R. P. Robinson to secure a balance on the purchase price of the property. The sale was made subject to a prior lien of \$13,000 due the heirs of S. H. Reed and was bid in by Mr. Robinson for \$11,000. Taking into consideration previous liens, etc., the property cost Mr. Robinson about \$27,000. This is a valuable locality and is located at Oak and Woodfin streets. W. W. Misener has been conducting it and will continue as the proprietor.

The most severe punishment dealt out in police court this morning was a 30-day road sentence, which fell to the lot of Will Bassett for the alleged offense of "beating up" Bessie Knight. It was another of the Maiden lane brawls and it seems that there was a hearing in the case before Magistrate F. N. Waddell yesterday under a peace warrant. At that time Bassett was put under a peace bond and taxed with the costs. He appealed from the decision this morning and bond was fixed at \$100. The few other cases tried did not amount to much.
