**BOOSTERS COMING FOR BIG MEETING**

Many Towns' Delegations to Work for Western North Carolina Organization.

**PLANS ARE DISCUSSED BY SUB-COMMITTEE**

Its Report Will Facilitate Work at 11 A. M. Gathering Tomorrow.

From present prospects it seems evident that the people all over western North Carolina are going to co-operate heartily in the movement started some time ago to advertise the resources of the section. The board of trade is receiving numbers of letters from persons from all over this part of the state commending the movement and assuring the board of their help and of the help of their towns. And there is little doubt but that the meeting which is to be held at the court house tomorrow at 11 o'clock for the purpose of organization, so that all towns can work together in concerted action, will be well attended. In fact, the letters already received give assurance of this. This afternoon the sub-committee, appointed at the boosters' banquet held in furtherance of the movement some weeks ago, meets in the board of trade rooms to discuss plans for publicity and organization which will be submitted to the meeting tomorrow. Most of the sub-committee arrived yesterday and this morning, and the conference this afternoon will prove of much importance as their discussions will greatly facilitate the work of the meeting tomorrow.

**Many Towns to Be Represented.**  
Letters have been received from Murphy, Waynesville, Bryson City, Sylva, Lenoir, Brevard, Montreat and Black Mountain and each of these states that these towns will be represented. A man from one of these towns in the city today stated that this movement is by far the biggest thing that has been undertaken for the western part of the state and one that will result in more good than any other.

**Railway Officials Here.**  
Some of the railway officials who will attend have already arrived. S. H. Hardwick, passenger traffic manager, and H. E. Waernicke, assistant land and industrial agent, of the Southern, and Mr. Brewer, land and industrial agent of the C. C. & O., will be present at the meeting, also W. C. Olds, traveling industrial agent of the Southern. Mr. Hardwick is now at the Battery Park hotel. The Southern railway has already expressed the intention of doing all possible for the movement and the other railroads interested in the section are expected to do the same. At the boosters' banquet President Finley spoke enthusiastically in favor of it.

Enthusiastic letter have come from M. L. Shipman, commissioner of labor and printing; J. F. Hayes of Brevard and J. L. Smathers of Murphy. A telephone message from Hendersonville to The Gazette-News today was that that town would be represented 50 strong, that they were coming on the 9:50 o'clock train and would be provided with boosters badges. The stockholders of the Buncombe county Farmers' Union Supply company, at a meeting held Saturday, decided to begin business early next month. They adjourned to meet again next Saturday further to discuss the details pertaining to the business. They have had marked success in placing the stock.

The board of trade has recently got out two attractive envelopes with agriculture and horticulture cuts. One shows a field of corn raised by R. C. Weaver of Weaverville, by which E. D. Weaver is standing, and the other is a cut of Lee Weaver holding a branch of apples that he raised this year. Both are representative of this country.

On account of the Buncombe County Sunday School convention, which meets at Weaverville tomorrow and Wednesday, the Asheville & East Tennessee railroad will run special cars from Weaverville to Asheville after the night session, which will reach the square at 11 o'clock. It is expected that many Asheville people will attend. An interesting program has been prepared.
