**SUPERIOR COURT HEARS CASES OF PETTY NATURE**  
**Many Submissions, but Few Defendants Are Sentenced**  
—Roberts Guilty.

Since Superior court convened the cases to be disposed of have been of minor importance, and those tried this morning were of the same nature. There have been many submissions and in some cases judgment has not been passed.

Robert Patterson was tried this morning for assault with a deadly weapon on Will Zurburg and was adjudged guilty, but sentence was not passed. Mr. Patterson appealed the case from police court, where he was given a road sentence. Mr. Zurburg was acquitted of a charge of like nature.

The case against Bessie Davis was not passed.

Ed. Foreman was sentenced to four months on the roads for larceny.

S. R. Roberts plead guilty in two cases charging violation of the search and seizure law.

H. F. Roberts plead guilty to embezzlement in eight cases but sentence was not passed. This is the defendant that was wanted in the west but who was kept here to answer these charges.

**Yesterday's Cases.**

Several cases of minor importance were disposed of yesterday.

S. W. Waldrop submitted to forcible trespass and was fined \$25 and the costs.

R. H. Burks plead guilty of carrying a concealed weapon and was fined \$25 and the costs.

The case against Henry Martin was not passed.

Colla Shepard plead guilty of retailing and judgment was suspended upon payment of the costs. She will be required to report at each term of court and show good behavior for two years.

Alonzo Foster plead guilty to a charge of assault with a deadly weapon, but no action was taken by the court today.

Lillie Bishop appeared and showed good behavior.

The case of L. W. Daugherty was continued until next Monday, October 30, and the witnesses were excused until that time.

A. L. McCormick was tried for running an automobile without tail lights and was discharged on payment of costs.

Riley Candler was found not guilty of violating the city ordinance regarding the soliciting of baggage at the depot and another case charging him with trespassing on the property of the Southern railway was not passed.

Both were appealed from the Police court, where the defendant was fined \$5 and costs in each case.

**FUNNY, ALL RIGHT**

"The Girl in the Taxi" Amuses Two Audiences of Rather Indifferent Size at Auditorium.

The laughing comedy sketch, "The Girl in the Taxi," was presented at the Auditorium yesterday at matinee and night performances but succeeded in drawing only fair sized crowds. It was advertised as a comic performance with the prime object of provoking mirth and as such was a decided success. The spirit of it might not be applauded by a great many people but it portrays conditions as they most certainly exist to a large extent. Its success, however, is not intended to come from the material of the plot but from the manner of presentation.

The situations are ludicrous in the extreme and in working these out the show is made one of the most entertaining witnessed here this season. It was certainly enjoyed by a majority of those who attended the performances here. The parts are well taken and those who carry the leading roles have been exceedingly drilled. Besides they have a natural aptitude for the parts they carry and the show suggests a chapter out of real life instead of a mimic presentation.

**WEDDING TAKES PLACE**

Two Courts Adjourn, One to Marry Couple, the Other to Witness Ceremony.

The courts of United States Commissioner R. S. McCall and Magistrate W. A. James, Jr., which were both in session yesterday afternoon, the former trying a man for dealing illicitly in whiskey, the latter arranging a man for practicing medicine without a license, both took a short recess shortly after 4 o'clock to witness the tying of a matrimonial knot.

The young couple were S. M. Penley and Anna Jones. They desired that Mr. James perform the ceremony at once and in order to do this the magistrate had to take a recess of his court. Those attending Mr. McCall's court in the adjoining room desired to see the ceremony and in consequence a recess was taken. The offices adjourn and the two parties assembled in Mr. James' office, where the brief ceremony was solemnized. The couple received the hearty congratulations of their impromptu attendants, whereupon the processes of the law resumed operations.

**CITY NEWS**

There will be an all members meeting of the Retail Merchants association in the board of trade rooms Thursday night at 8 o'clock.

Only one case was up for adjudication in police court today, an assault case which amounted to almost nothing in which the defendant was fined \$1 and the costs.

Swannanoa lodge No. 56, I. O. O. F., will confer the third degree at their meeting this evening at 8 o'clock. The meeting place is on Church street and visiting Odd Fellows are invited to be present.

Members of the missionary societies and study classes of the city, Sunday school workers, ministers, and all Christian workers are cordially invited to meet Mr. Vickry at Central Methodist church tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock, preparatory to the public moving picture lecture in that church tomorrow night.

L. R. Ingram, a young man whose home is said to be at High Point, was arrested yesterday afternoon on the charge of forging a check in the name of H. R. Millard and cashing it at the Citizens bank. In Police court this morning the case was continued. The accused is said to be belonging to a good family, and to have been "in hard luck."

Through his attorneys, Fortune & Roberts, Henry Wall has instituted suit against the Tennessee & North Carolina railroad for damages of \$2000 for alleged injuries received about a year ago near Crestmont, while in the employ of the company. The complaint sets out that while at work on the railroad track with a defective jack, the ratchet slipped and he lever struck the plaintiff in the side of abdomen, causing injuries from which he suffered severely.

R. H. King, general secretary of the Charleston Y. M. C. A. and acting executive for the "Men in Religion Forward Movement," met with a number of the ministers and laymen of the city today at the local association and outlined to them the method of organization of the movement and the work done by it. No action was taken in the matter. It being left over for consideration. Dinner was served to the men who gathered for the meeting.

W. E. Baker of Limestone was given a hearing before Magistrate James yesterday, charged with practicing medicine without license. He was acquitted. It was in evidence that he had been asked to prescribe for persons and that he replied that he was not a physician. One witness swore that Mr. Baker had prescribed for him but he could not remember when it was, and little importance was attached to this testimony. It was not proved that the defendant had charged for any practicing he might have done.

That the "Carolina Special" is of great benefit to western North Carolina and Asheville in particular, is evidenced by the large number of tickets sold through from cities in the central west for this train to Asheville. During the six days ending Oct. 14th, tickets to Asheville were sold from Cincinnati, Cleveland, Lorain and Coshocton, Ohio, in addition to cities in Illinois, Minnesota, and Indiana. From the various reports furnished by the traffic department of the Q. & C. route, Ohio furnishes a larger number of people coming to Asheville than any other state.

Eight boys were tried before Magistrate W. R. Judger yesterday afternoon on the charge of cutting down a line tree between the properties of the Asheville school and one of the Huncome county schools. The boys were Lee, Dale and Bryan Thrash, Roy and Rupert Crowell, Buck and Rupert Fletcher and a boy named Gaston. It was in evidence that the boys had obtained the permission of the Asheville school to remove the trees along the line but the prosecution contended that the permission of the other parties had not been obtained. After all the testimony was in, Mr. Judger decided that there was no case against the boys and they were discharged. The defendants were represented by Wells & Swain; the prosecution by H. C. Chedester.
