He and S. A. Woodard Will Probably Be Privately Employed in Tobacco Dis-solution Case.

LINEMAN BADLY HURT ON A HUNTING TRIP

Elks of Greensboro Will Give Most Elaborate Social Function, House Warming, This Evening.

Gazette-News Bureau, Daily News Building, Greensboro, Oct. 26.

The Elks of Greensboro have made elaborate preparations for a "house-warming" tomorrow night. Details of the event tend to show that the original desire to make this the most elaborate affair of the kind that Greensboro has ever known will be realized. Formal invitations to friends of the members have been mailed out and it is expected that the attendance will be large. In the receiving line will be Judge and Mrs. James E. Boyd, Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Justice, Judge and Mrs. R. M. Douglas and others; Mr. and Mrs. S. J. Kaufman and Miss Millicent Fisher will have charge of the punch bowl. Receiving in the ballroom will be Mr. and Mrs. Caesar Cone, Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Bradshaw, Mr. and Mrs. C. N. Cone and others. Mrs. L. G. Whittington, one of the oldest residents of Greensboro, died Tuesday night at her home on Ashboro street after an illness of less than three days. Mrs. Whittington, who was 84 years of age, suffered a stroke of paralysis Sunday evening and from that moment until her death no hope was entertained for her recovery. Surviving are two daughters and one son including Mrs. M. O. Wooten and J. A. Whittington of Greensboro and Mrs. Moore of Chicago.

Lineman Hurt While Opposing Hunting.

B. Irwin Brame, a lineman in the employ of the North Carolina Public Service corporation of Greensboro, at his home here in a critical condition as a result of a fall from a tree this week while "possum hunting." It seems that Brame with two other friends went for "possums"; that a "possum was treed and Brame with lantern in hand climbed the tree after the game. Some distance up his lantern went out and in attempting to re-light it, while sitting on a limb, the limb gave way and he was hurled quite a distance into a stream beneath and landed on rocks. He suffered a severe wound in the head; two ribs were broken and his arm fractured. He was taken to his home in an unconscious condition.

May Represent Farmers. Before leaving for Raleigh Tuesday afternoon to argue cases before the Supreme court, E. J. Justice admitted, in reply to a question of a newspaper man, that it was very probable that he with S. A. Woodard of Winston, would accept a request of President Alexander, of the State Farmers' union to make a presentation of the farmers' side of the case before the American tobacco trust. It is also stated that the union at its meeting, in Raleigh last week adopted a resolution empowering President Alexander to secure the services of these two brilliant lawyers in behalf of the tobacco growers of the state.

His connection his reported employment with Mr. Woodard had with the celebrated trust case, Mr. Justice replied that he did not know the employment had been made a public matter. He said, however, that President Alexander had written him to know if such an engagement would be possible or expedient, and that he was carefully considering the question before giving an answer at a conference to be held in Raleigh through a committee of the farmers' union. Mr. Woodard and himself, "I am sure," he added, "that this employment means no criticism or reflection upon those who are interesting themselves, officially, along these lines."

Asked what privately employed counsel could do which the state officials had not done, he replied instantly: "I have not decided yet just what, if anything, we could do in that case at this stage. I am convinced that the only effective remedy for the abuses declared by this our highest judicial authority to be not only flagrant, but long time criminally flagrant, is a term in the penitentiary. And until those men who have been judicially shown to be responsible for the present bad conditions, and who have been adjudged to be violators of the law, are convinced that there is danger of this remedy being applied by the court, there is not much likelihood of their proposing a plan for the dissolution of their 'criminal trust,' if the initiative is left to the criminals by Attorney-General Wickham."

"Would Call Me Firebrand If I Talked." Mr. Justice was unable to state whether the farmers would desire to supplement the brief of the attorneys-general of North and South Carolina and Virginia to the court on this question, with another coming more particularly from their standpoint as producers of the raw material. It is understood that these matters are to be determined at the conference of the committee and counsel in Raleigh.

Asked for more particulars of the proposals and objects Mr. Justice shook his head in refusal. He explained this refusal in the following strikingly original sentences: "I could grant your request and say more, but you see if I said all I ought to say on this subject, I would be called a 'fire brand,' and so what you call 'hot stuff' would be hurled to the world by the interested parties of the tobacco and all the independent lawyers, leaving ordinary of our country, as it is."

Nine-Cent Cotton. Philadelphia Press.

With the current quotation for cotton balancing about 9 cents a pound, a little under or over, this staple is cheaper than it has been for ten years.

Whether this exceptionally low price can be maintained with the current world demand is very doubtful. In the year ending last August the civilized world absorbed 37,819,970 bales of cotton. This consumption in round number of 18,000,000 bales came in a poor year for cotton manufacture.

The United States used 250,000 bales less than in a full year and its cotton plant for spinning was on three-quarter time. The English cotton industry boomed, but Germany and Japan ran behind. Taking it all, the demand for cotton in the last twelve months was a full 500,000 bales short of a good year and the American cotton carried over from the crop year ending August 31, was about 1,000,000 bales less than usual.

With cotton cheap, the world's capacity to absorb cotton will grow by at least 1,500,000 bales in the crop year now opening. The crop this year, 14,500,000 bales, is about 3,000,000 bales greater than the consumption of American cotton in the last crop year which Mr. Anton Schmidt, the leading British authority, puts at 11,559,401 bales. This excess means cheap cotton; but not so very much cheaper than now as expansion and supply stocks will absorb 2,500,000 bales or so.

Besides the American cotton, the world used 3,647,714 bales of East Indian cotton and 664,832 Egyptian. The United States is now and has for ten years been the great cotton manufacturing country. American mills use one-half more cotton than English mills and do it with only half as many spindles, so much will drive do in using machinery.
