**THE DIFFICULTIES THEY ENCOUNTER**

The Efforts and Triumphs of the Farm Demonstrators in the Various Counties.  
**VISIT TO BILTMORE FARM THIS AFTERNOON**

Another Meeting, Which May Be Final One, Is to Be Held This Evening.

In the convention of the North Carolina agricultural demonstrators, the reports from the various counties continues to take up most of the time. The demonstrators began their reports Wednesday morning and with the exception of one or two addresses they continued until today at noon. These reports are of an informal nature and consist of the experiences of the demonstrators in getting the farmers to adopt their methods and other problems which confront them. Most of them show that much progress has been made and that the farmers have realized that the demonstrator has suggestions of value to offer. It appears that some of them, however, have some difficulty in getting the farmers to use the improved methods, but where they once get a start, they seldom have any more trouble of this nature.

At the morning meeting there was expressed by some of the demonstrators the fear that if they improved the methods to any great extent, the farmers would produce more than would be taken very seriously. Mecklenburg and Alexander. Among those who have made their reports was Mr. Clark, of Mecklenburg, who is employed for all his time. He is the only county demonstrator in the state who gives all his time to the work, although it was shown that Mr. Lucas of Alexander although paid for only half his time devoted nearly all of it to the work. Mr. Lucas called attention to the fact that he had over 200 assistant demonstrators and co-operators and said that the reason his county authorities did not co-operate more with him was because the county had a boss.

Mr. Peale of Hoke county made an interesting talk this morning, telling of the difficulty of getting the Scotchmen of his county to take to his methods and how he had overcome this. Each of the demonstrators was questioned and these questions showed that they are all interested in learning what they can from each other.

Another excellent talk was made by Newton Jones of Rutherford county who had some interesting things to relate of the methods of corn raising in his county.

It was stated by the demonstrator from Guilford that there would not be more than half a crop of corn in that county.

This afternoon the demonstrators take a trip over the Biltmore estate and tonight they hold another meeting. There is some likelihood of finishing the work of the convention to-night but if it is not finished another will be held in the morning.

At last night's meeting, in addition to the reports of the demonstrators, O. B. Martin of Washington delivered a talk on the boys' clubs.

Duckett and Ernest Reid; from Pisgah lodge, Howard Hull will act as the representative, with Oscar White as alternate. Several members from each lodge, besides the delegates, are expected to go down for the meeting.

The object of the meeting is to hear reports from the various lodges, to find out how the order stands in point of growth and the work accomplished. Subjects pertaining to the good of the order will be discussed and regular business transacted.
