TRUE BILL FOUND AGAINST BALLEW
 Will Be Placed on Trial Thursday for Killing His Nephew, "Buck" Trivett.
MOST OF JAIL CASES ARE OUT OF THE WAY
 Solicitor Proposes to Try Some of the More Important Cases on Docket This Week.

The grand jury this morning entered the Superior court room and returned a true bill against W. P. Ballew for the killing of his nephew, young "Buck" Trivett. The case will be taken up Thursday morning. It was announced, and Solicitor Reynolds told the Gazette-News reporter that he would not ask for conviction for murder in the first degree.
 The circumstances of the killing will be remembered by most Asheville people, as it created quite a little excitement at the time. Young Trivett was killed in the sick room of his grandmother at the residence of his uncle near the depot. It appeared that Ballew and his nephew had been on bad terms and Trivett had been forbidden the house.
 Solicitor Reynolds stated that he proposed to try some of the more important cases on the docket this week. The first week of the term was taken up with the disposition of petty cases and most of the jail cases have been disposed of.
 It is likely Wiley Black, who is now on the county roads, will be tried for engaging in the "white slave traffic" at the Asheville hotel. He was bound to Superior court some months ago by Police Judge Adams, as was Ollie Bird, a woman who stayed at the hotel. Some of the search and seizure cases may also be heard before court adjourns.
 Corpening Goldsmith, a negro, was today arraigned on a charge of house-breaking, but the trial was not concluded at 2 o'clock. Wickesham Sanders, another negro, will also be tried for house-breaking.
 This morning Will Bassett pleaded guilty to a charge of assault, but was not sentenced.
 Clay Hoskins, who was tried Friday for an assault on Jack Williams, another negro, was sentenced to 30 days on the roads. The jury in this case was out several hours and finally returned a verdict of simple assault. The two men had a fight about two weeks ago and Hoskins struck Smith on the head with a hoe, inflicting a wound which it was feared might prove fatal. Smith has about recovered, however.
 Will Whitenburg, who was tried a few days ago and found guilty of the larceny of a rifle, was today granted a new trial, as it was made to appear that some of his witnesses had not been summoned, and he contends that he can prove an alibi. The trial will take place the latter part of the week.

CITY NEWS

The home of Walter Ray at Beavertown was yesterday totally destroyed by fire, none of the contents of the house being saved. It is said that there was no insurance on either the building or contents.
 Malcolm Angier, who is a student at the Bingham school, is now at his home in Durham attending the funeral of his father, John C. Angier, who died suddenly Friday in New York, while on a business trip. Mr. Angier was one of the most prominent business men of Durham.

In an account of the conveyance of a tract of land, published Saturday in The Gazette-News, it was stated that George M. Foster and wife had conveyed certain land to William R. Sluder. This should have been George M. Foster, alone; the "and wife" should have been omitted.

Tomorrow is the last day that two per cent discount will be allowed to taxpayers. Judging from the number that have paid taxes today, many must have realized this. Tax Collector R. J. Crowell states that he has been busy all day writing receipts, some of which were for amounts of more than \$1000.

Charged with working in an illicit distillery, alleged to have been conducted by J. W. Smith of Paint Rock, H. S. Lones, a young white man, waived examination before United States Commissioner R. S. McCall Saturday afternoon and was bound to the District court. In default of bond he was placed in jail.

A complaint has been filed in the office of the clerk of court by attorney for the plaintiff, Wells & Swain, in the case of Will Davenport vs. Moffatt Machinery company, in which he plaintiff asks for \$5000 on account of injuries received, when he fell in an elevator that was being installed in the old Berkeley hotel building.

S. A. Lynch today purchased through J. W. Wolfe of the Carolina Realty company, Capt. J. A. Wagner's home place and a lot adjoining on Woodfin street. The property is very desirable, the dwelling being a 12-room building, which has been lately remodeled. The purchase price is not given out but a piece of property at the corner of Waretta street and Pearson drive was given in exchange as part payment.

After one of the most successful seasons in its history, the Dula Springs hotel closes November 1, until next spring. During the summer and fall the house, which is under the management of C. C. Chambers, has been filled to its capacity. Numbers of people had to be turned away. Most of the guests of the hotel are those who have been going to the springs every year since the hotel was built.

The formal laying of the cornerstone of Trinity church will take place Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Rev. H. Fields Saumenig, rector of the church, will officiate and will be assisted by Dr. Rodney Rush Swope, rector of All Souls' church, Biltmore. The Trinity church choir will furnish the music for the occasion. A special service is being prepared for the event but the program has not yet been issued.

The postoffice authorities are advertising for proposals for the performance of the regulation screen wagon mail service for Asheville for the contract term of four years, beginning July 1, 1912, and ending June 30, 1916. The blank forms for the bids can be obtained from the Asheville postmaster and they must be submitted to the office of the second assistant postmaster general at Washington by 4:30 o'clock on the afternoon of January 9, 1912.

Vessel Goes Down: Another Ashore.
 Key West, Fla., Oct. 30.—The American schooner, Star of the Sea, bound from Pensacola to Porto Rico with a cargo of lumber, is reported ashore on French Reef, and several vessels have gone from here to render assistance.
 News also has just been received that the schooner Winfield S. Schuster, from Norfolk to Port Tampa, coal laden, struck the Rehoboth shoal and immediately sank. A contract has been made to save the cargo of the schooner.
