# H. D. GENTRY PERJURY CASE IS UP FOR TRIAL

**Grows Out of Testimony in Allison Murder Case—Court Proceedings.** When court took recess at noon today the case against H. D. Gentry, who is charged with perjury, was still being heard, having been taken up about 10 o'clock. Gentry was on the stand.

The charge of perjury grew out of Gentry's testimony in the trial of J. B. Allison for the murder of Floyd McGee over a year ago. A man named Bradley living in West Asheville testified on a certain day before the killing, and later Gentry testified that on that date he had seen Bradley in Swain county. It was afterward proved by several witnesses that Bradley was not in Swain county when Gentry said he was and in fact had helped to dig a grave near Asheville. Gentry was then indicted for perjury and the case has been pending since then.

Little was done before this case was taken up, although several cases were called. Pete Ingle and Jake Murray were called and an affidavit and capias were issued for them. Bud Hampton, having pleaded guilty a few days ago to a charge of assault, was fined \$5 and the costs.

Jim Brackett, who was given five months on the roads for resisting an officer, had the term reduced to three months.

The case against Jacob Horne, a negro accused of attempted criminal assault on a negro woman at Weaverville several weeks ago, was continued, the defendant being required to give \$100 bond.

The case against Wiley Black charged with engaging in the "white slave traffic," was continued until later in the week.

**Yesterday Afternoon.** After hearing the case against Dr. L. P. Russell of Fletcher, who was charged with writing whiskey prescriptions illegally, and who was recently fined \$500 for the offense in police court, from which he appealed, Judge Lane held that there was not sufficient evidence against Dr. Russell for the case to go to the jury and he was accordingly discharged. This action was taken after G. S. Reynolds, counsel for the defense, had made a motion to quash the indictment, which was overruled.

Dr. Russell was arrested on a bench warrant ordered by Police Judge Adams as the result of the prosecution of C. C. Seawell, who was charged with selling whiskey to J. B. Wilson without a prescription. At this trial it was brought out that Wilson had a prescription given him by Dr. Russell. It was contended by the prosecution that Wilson was not a bona fide patient of Dr. Russell.

The grand jury was dismissed after the business had been disposed of, and after the county institutions had been visited.

The report of the grand jury was that the county jail was in good condition and the prisoners properly cared for; also Brittain's convict camp and the offices in the county court house. Luther's convict camp was found to be in a satisfactory condition with the exception of sanitation. It was recommended that a railing be placed around the fountain pool in the rear of the court house.

A separate report was made on the children's home and certain recommendations were made. The administration was found to be satisfactory. It was recommended that the tin floor of the upper porch be painted; that the floor of the front porch be repaired; that the kitchen cupboard be lined with tin on account of mice; that a heater be installed in the living room; that a large oak overhanging the house be cut down; and that a white oak at the northwest corner be trimmed.

# DALRYMPLE IS STABBED AND NICHOLS IS JAILED

A rather serious stabbing affray occurred on Pine street last night, when George Dalrymple received a severe wound in his right side from the knife. The wound was inflicted with a knife in the hands of Will Nichols. It is thought that the knife penetrated his liver and right lung. Dr. Reeves was called to his assistance and dressed the wound. The man is in a rather serious condition, but it is stated that he has chances of recovery, if no complications set in.

The trouble seems to have started over a Halloween celebration or serenade party. According to the injured man the serenade party, of which he was a member, was passing the home of Nichols, when the latter dared him to go through his yard. He said he made no attempt to do so but had remarked that he would go if he wanted to. He said Nichols then stabbed him and he ran to his home a short distance away.

According to Nichols, the serenaders had talked of coming in and having a big time in his back yard and Dalrymple had made the suggestion. He said he ordered them not to come in but they had started, and Dalrymple cursed him and struck him, whereupon he had drawn his knife and inflicted the wound.

Nichols was found under a bed in his house a short while after the affray by the police and was locked up. The case was called in police court this morning but was continued until November 5, to await developments in Dalrymple's condition. Meantime, Nichols is held without bail.

# THE MARKETS

New York, Nov. 1.—Prices lifted rapidly at the opening of the stock market today. The unexpectedly good showing of the United States steel corporation's quarterly report led to a keen demand for steel stocks and all the leading issues. Trading in steel was in enormous volume, with short interests the chief purchasers. Numerous other stocks manifested pronounced strength.

The most vigorous bull movement of several months occurred in the impulsive given to speculation by the government's attitude toward the American Tobacco company's re-organization plan. Operations for long accounts were carried on vigorously and prices were forced upward in every quarter. Reports that banking interests were advising purchases on the long side of the market helped to create a more cheerful sentiment. Many stocks were up between 1 and 2 points, with business broader and more active as prices advanced.

Prices eased off a fraction, with speculation becoming very dull.

**Cotton Market Fluctuates.** New York, Nov. 1.—The cotton market opened steady with November unchanged and with other months 3 to 10 points net higher in response to local covering on the Liverpool cable's steadiness and apprehension over storm warnings issued for the South Atlantic coast. Prices broke about seven points from the top, but there was a second upturn on killing frost predictions for the western belt during the next 48 hours.

Later in the forenoon the market showed increasing strength and activity, leading months advancing about a dozen points over the close yesterday with good buying from all quarters. There was less active pressure from the room bears, who realized the market's technical position was not particularly favorable for selling operations at the moment. The commission houses were good buyers on the upturn. The western belt forecast indicated freeing weather tomorrow.
