TAKING TESTIMONY IN BALLEW CASE

Miss Stein, Nurse, Tells of Killing of Trivett, and Coroner Describes Wound.

ACQUITTAL OF BALLEW CONFIDENTLY EXPECTED

Jury Returns Verdict of Not Guilty in Perjury Case Against H. D. Gearty.

In Superior court, after some of the less important cases had been disposed of this morning, the case of W. Pitt Ballew, charged with the killing of his nephew, young "Buck" Trivett, several weeks ago in a family dispute, was called and he was arraigned for murder. Solicitor Reynolds stated that he would not ask for conviction for murder in the first degree but in the second degree or for manslaughter and the trial proceeded. There are only three witnesses for the state and two of these were examined this morning. These were Coroner E. R. Morris and Miss Stein, the trained nurse, who was in the Ballew home on the night of the killing, taking care of Mr. Ballew's mother, who was very sick and afterward died.

Dr. Morris testified as to the number of bullet wounds and where they were, after which Miss Stein took the stand. Miss Stein told her story of the sad affair in a cool and collected manner and her evidence was practically the same as that given at the coroner's inquest.

She told of the trouble between Mr. Ballew and his nephew Allan Trivett, and of how Trivett's mother sided against her brother. She said that after the two men had had one dispute, Trivett had remarked that if Ballew had a warrant sworn out for him he would kill him; and that later he had said if he had had a chance he would have knocked Ballew in the head, and his mother said "you ought to have done it long ago."

Then she spoke of the events immediately before the tragedy, when Ballew and his nephew Allan Trivett were in the room, where the nurse was with Mrs. Ballew. They were quarreling. Allan came and tried to get in and she told him to go away but at once his mother came and opened the door and let him in. She saw the smoke of the first shot, after Ballew and Allan had had some words, but did not see the pistol; she hid her face and heard other shots.

It is likely that Paul Trivett's testimony will be completed this afternoon and some of the defense's witnesses also. It is not thought that the trial will last very long and there are confident expressions to the effect that Ballew will be acquitted.

In the case of H. D. Gearty, charged with perjury, which was concluded this morning, the jury returned a verdict of not guilty.

STRANGE CULT'S LEADER BOUND OVER TO COURT

Rev. Frank W. Sanford Held in \$10,000 Bond as Result of Fatal Cruise.

Portland, Me., Nov. 2.—Rev. Frank W. Sanford, leader of the "Holy Ghost and U. Society" of Shiloh, was held at a preliminary hearing yesterday for trial before the December term of the United States court on a charge of causing the death of Charles Hughey, on board the yacht Coronet, by failing to provide proper and sufficient food when the yacht put to sea. United States Commissioner Bradley placed the bond at \$10,000 which was furnished and Sanford was released.

An interesting and unexpected feature of the hearing was the introduction of the Shiloh creed. One portion, relating to the leadership, read: "I believe that Rev. Frank W. Sanford, of Shiloh, Me., tells the truth when he makes proclamation that God said unto him, 'Elijah is here, testify,' and again, 'I have found David; words spoken as applying to him personally. I believe in and accept him as such.'"

Robert McKay, first mate of the Kingdom before she was wrecked, testified that after the disaster her mast was cut away and the vessel was set on fire. Sanford, he said, declared the Kingdom was a burnt offering for Africa.

Dr. Charles E. Banks of the marine hospital testified that Charles Hughey, as well as John Foster, another follower of Sanford, died of starvation, complicated with scurvy.

That Sanford proposed to the deck of his yacht Coronet to become a slaughter-house should his people disobey him, was another feature of the testimony.

Captain Rowland Whittin, a former sailing master of the Shiloh yacht, who testified to this effect, also declared that Sanford feared to enter the water. "How can we make port with these traitors on board?" was one remark made by the "moderator" Elijah when several of his people became disaffected, the witness said. Captain Whittin further declared that Sanford had said he "would sail the Coronet into hell," if he had received divine instruction to that effect.

Reports that the National Ginners association estimated the ginning to November 1 at 10,000,000 bales were followed by more aggressive selling late in the afternoon for both southern and local accounts. Prices at midday were 8 to 15 points net lower. While there was buying for a reaction around 8.90 for January, the market's tone was very nervous and unsettled.
