W.N.C. CONFERENCE MEETS NEXT WEEK

Only One Pastorate, That of Mr. Christenberry, Expires by Limitation.

PASTORS WILL GO UP WITH GOOD REPORTS

All Have Served Their First Year Here, Except Rev. G. G. Harley of North Asheville.

The Asheville Methodist ministers, with the other Methodist preachers of Western North Carolina are making preparations to attend the annual conference that is to meet Wednesday in Statesville. This is the busiest time of the year for Methodist preachers. They are winding up the work of the conference year, preparing their many reports and trying to go up with a clean slate so far as their collections are concerned. At the same time the stewards are doing what they can to "pay the preacher."

"Church members are prone to put off this paying until the very last minute but it is nearly always the case that the well established church pays up in full. The members, at least the stewards and the prominent members, take great pride in going to conference with the preacher's salary all paid, and the pastor is equally keen about his collections for various causes. It is the same tale every year. The members are away behind in their assessments, but somehow the money is raised.

During the year the Methodist churches of Asheville have been in a prosperous condition. There are four Methodist pastors in the city and they have all done good work. With the exception of Rev. G. G. Harley, pastor of the North Asheville church, who has been here three years, the pastors are in their first year here. They are allowed to stay four years at one charge and it is not expected that many changes will be made.

At the Biltmore church, however, Rev. C. G. Christenberry has served his full four years and will have to leave. It is mere speculation to predict the next pastor.

Of the city churches it is said that all the pastors will go up with good reports. Rev. W. A. Newell of the Haywood street church states that his collections will be more than twice as much as they were last year. This church has a membership of 66. The last quarterly conference will be held tonight when the finances will be settled up. In this case no change is anticipated.

Rev. Dr. C. W. Byrd has only been at Central church a year, having transferred charges with Rev. G. H. Detwiler, who went to Nashville just before conference last year. The last quarterly conference of this church will be held Monday night. The members of this church are not expecting any change.

Rev. L. T. Hitt, pastor of Bethel church, was appointed to the work shortly after conference, when Rev. Mr. Miller unaccountably disappeared from the city. It is thought that Mr. Hitt will also be sent back. He is still a member of the Virginia conference but if he is sent back he can easily be transferred. The last quarterly meeting at this church will be held tomorrow night.

Most of the preachers will leave Monday and Tuesday for Statesville. The committees organize on Tuesday and conference opens Wednesday morning.

COUNTRY LIFE JOURNAL WILL USE PHOTOGRAPHS

And Descriptive Matter Pertaining to Mountain Automobile Road.

Secretary Buckner of the board of trade today received a letter from P. M. Kiley of the editorial department of Country Life in America, saying that the text matter about the road opened recently by E. W. Grove to the summit of Sunset mountain, together with several photographs, had been received. The letter stated further that part of the written matter and one of the photographs had been kept, while the rest was returned. That which was kept, he said, would likely be used in their publication as it would doubtless prove interesting to their readers.

The publication in which the photograph will appear is one of the leading magazines of its kind published and it is a matter for congratulation for the board of trade officials that they are able to get Asheville view, and reading matter in it. At the same time, the publishers would not use it if they did not feel that it was worth their attention, and they doubtless pay out good money for photographs that are of no more general interest than that referred to.

This is only one of the several magazines and papers that have recently taken photographs of the Grove roadway sent them by the board of trade, but considering the character of the publication, it is not a matter of small importance.
