**PLAN ADOPTED FOR REFORM SCHOOL**

**Probation Officer's Salary to Go Toward Its Support— Routine Business.**

At the meeting of the board of aldermen last night it was decided to accept the proposition of the county commissioners in regard to the establishment of the reform or training school for the city and county, whereby the city is to furnish the old waterworks property on the Swannanoa river, consisting of about 65 acres of land and several buildings, the county to repair the buildings and maintain the institution, provided the city will pay the amount now paid to the probation officer, and furnish the street sweepings and manure from the city stables for enriching the farm. From this it would seem that those who have worked so long to have the school established are about to see their plans realized, practically in the way it has been suggested.

Several other matters of more or less importance were attended to at the meeting, one of which was the enactment into law, which takes effect today, of the ordinance forbidding coasting and roller skating within the city limits.

The special tax committee recommended that the request of the city market meat dealers that their tax be rescinded, be not granted.

The city engineer reported on the matter of establishing a property line on North Main street. His report was to the effect that the stores north of the new hotel are not on the property of the city. The street superintendent was then instructed to confer with the property owners to see what propositions they would make to sell the city enough land to put the property line back on a line with the new hotel.

No definite action was taken about having the cars of the Asheville Electric company circle the square in order to do away with some of the congestion on Pack square when all the cars meet every 15 minutes. It was reported that the local officials of the company are willing to take the matter up with the general officials, but that the change would probably cost \$75,000.

N. Buckner requested that a property line be established on Aston lane, which was referred to the city engineer for report at the next meeting.

To the street committee was referred the proposition of F. A. Sumner to donate Lenox avenue to the city and to keep it up through the winter, provided the city would lay a curb.

The complaints of the property owners of Magnolia avenue and Roberts street in regard to their paving assessments were also referred to the street committee to report after the work on both streets has been completed.

The obtaining of new benches for the police court room was referred to the police and market house committees.

No action was taken in regard to the request of S. D. Pelham that he be allowed to retain his sign over the sidewalk. This had already been referred to the city engineer to determine if the light is over city property.

The complaint that some of the advertisements had been taken from the drop curtain at the Auditorium, which were placed there, it is claimed, with the understanding that they were to remain, was referred to the city attorney. The owners wish the curtain returned to them.

The Auditorium committee reported that the fire escape had been erected at the Auditorium but had just been painted and had not been thoroughly tested. Some of the school boys and the firemen will be asked to test it.
