RETAIL MERCHANTS FORM FEDERATION

National Organization—Archibald Nichols Is One of the Directors.

Archibald Nichols returned recently from Chicago, where he attended a meeting of the various retail mercantile associations of the country, and where there was formed "The National Federation of Retail Merchants." There was an attendance of about 250 delegates from 33 states, representing almost every line of the mercantile business and Mr. Nichols took an active part in the business of the meeting, being chosen as a member of the board of directors, representing the shoe line.

So far no publicity has been given the meeting and the organization of the association by the lay press but an account of the proceedings is given in the Hardware Reporter, published at Oneida, N. Y.

It is stated that the delegates went to the meeting determined to accomplish something and that they handled the various questions "without gloves."

The officers of the association are as follows: M. J. Maloney of Detroit, president; E. C. Robinson of St. Louis, vice president; J. P. Russell of Chicago, treasurer; J. R. Moorehead of Lexington, Mo., secretary.

The different lines represented on the board of directors are: groceries, hardware, coal dealers, builders' supplies, furniture, shoes, lumber, implements, dry goods and furnishings, drugs, and clothing.

It was the sense of the organization that a campaign of education be started in order to relieve the merchant somewhat of the responsibility of the high cost of living.

Among the objects of the organization is put down: the serving of interests of the retail merchants, the opposing of unjust legislation inimical to retail merchants, the promoting of just legislation benefiting retail merchants, the demonstrating of the necessity of the retail merchant to the manufacturer, wholesaler and consumer, and to co-operate with all other organizations having for their objects the advancement of the best interests of commerce.

SUMNER'S OLD STAND

\$10,000 BOND IS MADE OF FRANKLIN SLAYER

J. H. Pearce, Jr., Faces Murder Charge as Result of His Relative's Tragic Death.

The Hotel Raleigh, Raleigh, Nov. 8.
J. Hackney Pearce, Jr., a young white man of Franklin county, was admitted to jail yesterday afternoon by Judge R. H. Peebles in the sum of \$10,000, Pearce having sworn out a writ of habeas corpus. He killed Alexander Macon, his brother-in-law, in a scuffle at the latter's home November 1, while the two were struggling, it was said today, over the possession of a shotgun. Macon was shot in the right side of the face, and the coroner's jury held Pearce without bail for the killing. After hearing the evidence Judge Peebles said it looked to him as if the state had made out a prima facie case of murder in the second degree and fixed the amount of bond at \$10,000, justly. Pearce was carried to Louisville last evening and will give bond to the clerk of the court of Franklin county.

Col. Theo. S. Kenan II, who for many years has been clerk to the Supreme court, continues ill at his home on North Wilmington street. His condition was no worse today, and yesterday was somewhat improved.

Train Over Wrecked.
Seaboard train No. 43, whose engine was derailed below Columbia Monday, has been unfortunate in the matter of wrecks. At Merry Oaks last Friday this train was derailed, with 11 injuries, and three months ago it was wrecked at Swainsboro, S. C., the engine being the same.

The authorities are holding Lawrence Robinson, a negro, on the charge of tampering with the switch at Swainsboro, and it is said that the former derailment at this point was caused by a wrecker.

Negro Student Arrested.
Tom Aldridge of Goldsboro, a student at Shaw University, was taken to Goldsboro last night on a warrant charging forgery. It appears that Tom and his brother, John Aldridge, bought some watermelons last summer and gave in payment a check on Geo. W. Autry. This was, it is alleged, a forgery.

Conference Meets Next in Harnett.
The Eastern North Carolina Christian conference, in session at Catawba Springs church, near McCollers, has decided to hold the next conference at Pleasant Union church, Harnett county. In spite of bad weather, the conference has been well attended.

For Hookworm Dispensaries.
The board of county commissioners has appropriated the sum of \$250 for the purpose of providing five free hookworm dispensaries in Wake county. The hookworm commission has so many applications that it is not thought the dispensaries will be opened here before the first of the year.

LAUD LINCOLN AT UNVEILING

greatly, for to my mind there seemed no escape from the armed collision of the sections."

He spoke of Lincoln's teaching and example, and paid a glowing tribute to President as a peace maker. He said:

His Teaching and Example.
"Tragedy walks hand-in-hand with history and the eyes of glory are wet with tears—'With malice toward none, with charity for all'—since Christ said 'blessed are the peacemakers for they shall be called the children of God,' has heart of man, stirred in its depths by human sympathy, delivered a message so sublime that probably the mind recoils to that other martyr of the ages, whom not

alone in the circumstances of obscure birth and tragic death, but in those of simple living and childlike faith, Lincoln so closely resembled. You lovely cabin which is to be officially dedicated on the morrow may well be likened to the manger of Bethlehem, the boy that went thence to a God-like destiny, to the Son of God, the Father Almighty, of him and of us all. For, whence his prompting except from God?"

"There are utterances of his which read like rescripts from the Sermon on the Mount. Reviled even as the Man of Galilee, slain, even as the Man of Galilee, yet as gentle and as unoffending a man, a man who died for men? Roll the stone from the grave and what shall we see? Just an American. The declaration of independence his confession of faith. The constitution of the United States his ark and covenant of liberty. The union his redoubt, the flag his shibboleth."

His peroration was as follows: "Let us here highly resolve, the words still ring like a trumpet-call from that green-grown hillside of Gettysburg dotted with the graves of heroes, 'that these men shall not have died in vain; that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom; and that government of the people, by the people and for the people shall not perish from the earth.' Repeat we the declaration. Let it here, whether we call ourselves democrats or republicans, renew our allegiance to the constitution of the republic and the perpetuity of the union!"
