MOVEMENT FOR A PARK AT CHILDREN'S HOME

Petition Presented to Commissioners Yesterday, but No Action Was Taken.

A movement is on foot to make such arrangements with the board of county commissioners that a part of the grounds of the children's home, in Grease, may be turned over to the city to be converted into a park for the use of all of the children of the city, and growing up, for that matter. A petition was presented to the commissioners yesterday afternoon, asking that negotiations be started at once with the city authorities to carry out the above plans, but the board did not take any action yesterday. However, the petition was filed.

According to the plans of those who are trying to promote this arrangement, eight acres can be taken from the 10 acres composing the property of the home for the use of the park, while the inmates of the home will be allowed the use of the eight acres and the exclusive use of two acres. The park would be under the management of those in charge of the children's home. A waiting shed would be constructed on the property on the line of the Asheville Electric company. It is also thought that as the city grows in that direction the county authorities might consent to sell part of the property to the city.

Such use of this valuable property, as is proposed, it seems would be an ideal arrangement, and it is not thought there will be much opposition to it. There are only about 20 children in the home and they would not be deprived of the use of any of the grounds by this arrangement. There have been numerous expressions recently to the effect that the county is not getting as much out of this property as it might, as there are so few children in the home, and the conversion of part of it into a park will no doubt meet the approval of the majority of the taxpayers.

An order was made yesterday that the commissioners with the directors of the Children's home shall confer with the city authorities in reference to the petition.

COUNTRY CLUB CHOOSES DIRECTORS AND OFFICERS

Plan for Separation of Financial from Active Management Decided on.

The stockholders of the Asheville Country Club held a meeting yesterday afternoon for the purpose of electing officers and directors and to transact other business. On motion of T. W. Knott it was voted that new by-laws be submitted at an adjourned meeting to be held January 16, which will provide for the separation of the financial management from the active management of the club. By this arrangement a board of governors will be chosen from the membership, from which officers and the chairman of committees will be selected, and another board will be chosen from the stockholders to take charge of the business, with the exception of dues and money received from visitors.

The following officers were elected: Dr. Charles L. Minor, president; Dr. Carl V. Reynolds, vice president; E. C. Todd, secretary; J. A. Burek, treasurer. The directors are Dr. Minor, S. H. Brown, Dr. Reynolds, E. C. Todd, J. A. Burek, E. C. Sawyer and H. P. Seymour.

The secretary's report showed a membership of 263, of which 121 are women, an increase of 45. The amount of money received from visitors was \$328. Last year only \$38 was collected from this source. The receipts of the club were \$3,747.50, the expenditures \$2,769.87, leaving a balance of \$784.88.
