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A NEW HARDWARE COMPANY FORMED

Has Leased Asheville Hardware Co. Store and Will Begin Business Shortly.

It was learned today that Asheville is to have a new hardware store within a short time. The Brown Hardware Company, which is the name of the new concern, will engage in a general hardware business.

The new company has leased the store room at 25 North Main street, now occupied by the Asheville Hardware company, and as soon as the store is vacated it will undergo extensive improvements. The plans provide for tearing out the old front of the store, and replacing it with an up-to-date plate glass front.

The Brown Hardware company will be under the management of Hugh C. Brown. He is a young man of large experience in the hardware business, having been with the Asheville Hardware company for the past eleven years. John H. Cathey, another member of the firm, will also be actively connected with the business. Mr. Cathey has been in the hardware business here and in Charlotte for the past seven years. Both he and Mr. Brown are Asheville young men, and their friends predict for them much success in their new business. These young men have associated with them some of the strongest and best known business men in the city.

The Brown Hardware company will incorporate with a capitalization of \$12,000, but all of this will not be paid at present. In fact, it is stated that all of the stock has been subscribed that will be issued at present.

It is not yet stated just when the business will be started. It will depend on the time that it will take for the Asheville Hardware company, now in receivership, to vacate the building which the new concern will occupy. The stock will be installed as soon after that as possible.

It is believed that there is a good field for another hardware business in Asheville and the management has the confidence of those who have invested. The company is formed for the purpose of doing a retail business and will not engage in the wholesale trade, at least not at this time.

DECLAMATION CONTEST WON BY CARL MESSLER

Last Night's One of the Best Contests in High School's History.

Carl Messler was last night chosen to represent the Asheville High school at the interschool declamation contest to be held in Durham, under the auspices of the "North" club of Trinity college, on December 1. Mr. Messler won the place in a preliminary contest held in the school building and his subject was "The South and the Negro Problem." The contest which he will enter at Durham was started by the 1909 Trinity club. It is for the purpose of arousing interest in literary societies and declamation throughout the state and is a most commendable movement. With such a representative from Asheville it is thought there is an excellent chance of bringing the gold medal, which is the prize to the winner, to this city.

Mr. Messler had strong competition for the place and John Brookshire won second honors with "The Charm of the Impossible" as his subject, and Bascomb James was third with "Father Time, the Tombstone," "Patrick Henry" was the subject of William Keener's declamation. Two excellent vocal solos were rendered by Miss May Corson and a violin solo by George Shuford. T. J. Harkins, Gilmer Welch and W. H. Daniel were the judges.

Mr. Messler had hitherto demonstrated his talents as a public speaker; he was selected as the result of a preliminary contest to represent the High school in the Western North Carolina debate, held here, and also won first honor in the interschool debate of his school.

WELFARE ASSOCIATION NEEDS MORE MEMBERS

Methods Suggested for Keeping Probation Officer—The Curfew Law Discussed.

At a meeting yesterday afternoon of the Child's Welfare association in the office of Dr. C. C. Minor several matters were discussed having to do with the good of the organization and the children of the city. This association was active in putting on foot the movement to establish a reform school and its success in this is very gratifying. The members also talked over the question of the discontinuance of the office of probationer and regret was expressed that the office could not be continued, and methods were suggested for keeping up the good work.

The curfew law was also referred to, the opinion being given that it is already a "dead letter," judging from the number of young people seen nightly on the streets, but it was recognized that it is difficult to enforce it.

There are now about 75 members in the association and it is hoped that the membership can be increased in order that the work of the organization may be broadened in its scope. Women as well as men will be welcomed into the association.

CITY NEWS

There will be a called meeting of the Spanish War Veterans, held tomorrow at 10 o'clock in the hall of the court house. Every member is urged to attend.

Rev. Dr. Thomas Lawrence will preach at Central Methodist church tomorrow at 11 o'clock in the absence of Rev. Dr. Tynd, who is attending the Western North Carolina conference.

Patrolmen were called to "Inclusion" in Victoria this morning to quell a riot and brought back Joe Murray and three women, who had engaged in it. They were locked up and will have a hearing Monday morning.

At the Y. M. I. tomorrow afternoon at 5 o'clock some service will be held. Also Rev. W. H. Monok, pastor of the A. M. E. church, will deliver an address. The speaker is able and capable of giving good talks. Bible class will be held at 4 o'clock. There was a large attendance last Sunday. It is announced, and the invitation is general.

The United States Circuit court is still engaged in hearing the case of United States vs. Hixson Lumber company, in which the title to 5000 acres of land is involved, the point of the dispute being about the location of a corner. At 11 o'clock the court took a recess until Monday morning. The morning session was devoted to the taking of testimony of certain of the original chain bearers, who were engaged in making the survey.

In the matter of the estate of Anna E. McWhorter, deceased, trustee under the will of the deceased filed his report which has been ratified and approved by the clerk of Superior court. Covering the time between the dates, November, 1909, and October 31, 1911, the report shows that the receipts from the estate amounted to \$42,791, and the disbursements \$39,117. Among the receipts is \$2,000 for the sale of the deceased's home in Asheville. The trustee is allowed \$195, 5 percent, of the total receipts.

There were six cases called in police court this morning but none of them were ready for trial and a continuance was taken in each one until Monday. These cases included one each against C. C. Seawell and "Cat" Losby for selling whiskey to R. W. Glenn without a prescription. Duff Forney, Fred Fowler, Cora Jones and Ross Swink were each charged with assault with deadly weapons. With these continued cases and the probability of the usual Monday morning docket, the session at that time promises to be rather interesting.
